OFFICIAL BLUNDER BRINGS NEW TRIAL

IRON RIVER, Mich., March 5—(U.P.)—When a deputy sheriff posted a sign on a court room door here which read "No admittance; the judge is talking," he automatically gave a new trial to Axel Nygard, serving a life sentence for murder. Although every other plea of defense counsel for a new trial was denied by Judge R. C. Flannigan, the latter ruled that the sign, placed on the court room door through the deputy's blunder, had interfered with Nygard's constitutional rights to public trial.

The accused man was charged with the murder of Sigmund Zeykowiak in a holdup at the latter's poolroom here in April, 1924.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore., March 5—(Special)—Miss Esther Church of Ashland, has been made president of a newly organized music student body on this campus. Harvey A. Miss Church is a senior in the School of Music and a member of Delta Gamma sorority, while Mr. Woods is a sophomore in the School of Medicine and is affiliated with Lambda Psi.
