CAVALRY INSTRUCTION NOT TO BE GIVEN THIS SUMMER

All mounted instruction for C. M. T. C. candidates from Oregon and Washington will be given at Camp Lewis and will be consolidated under the supervision of the 10th Field Artillery.

In past years a troop of Cavalry has been brought up from Monterey, California for the purpose of instructing C. M. T. C. and R. O. T. C. students. For reasons of economy this will not be done this year and Cavalry instruction will not be given, the Cavalry candidates being enrolled in the Artillery course. There will be no loss of standing in this transfer as the Cavalry training fits in properly with the work of the individually mounted non-commissioned and commissioned officers of the Artillery.

Applications from former candidates are now being received for the various Camps, over fifty having been received by Vancouver Barracks alone. Students having completed the basic, red or white course are urged to get their applications in at once.

Requests for information and applications to attend the Camps should be sent to the Commanding Officer of the post where the Camp in question is to be held.

Coast Artillery will be trained at Fort Worden while Field Artillery will go to Camp Lewis. The Camps at Vancouver Barracks and Fort George Wright will be devoted exclusively to infantry training.

FIGHT ON RESIN IS HELD FOOLISH

NEW YORK, March 10 (U.P.)—More and more it appears to be certain that the controversy started between the major leagues over the rule restoring the privilege of using resin on a pitcher's hand is a political controversy over a minor issue.

The National League made the suggestion that interest in the game could be stimulated if hitting could be decreased and proposed the amendment of the freak pitching rule to permit pitchers to use resin on their hands.

The American League immediately opposed the change in the rule and the National League made a fight out of it which was won in joint session when Commissioner Landis voted with the National League magnates.

The American League refused to be licked and followed the rather radical procedure of voting the second time against the rule and announcing that American League pitchers could not use resin in helping them to control the ball.

The National League then charged that their rival magnates were not opposed so much to the resin rule as they were to the Commissioner and that the issue had been raised merely to take an indirect slap at the Commissioner.

They maintain that if the American League club owners didn't want pitchers rubbing their hands with resin in public view they did not have to shout before the whole world that Landis and the National League were wrong.

There are known to be such things as gentlemanly agreements among the baseball people and the American Leaguers might have passed the word to managers that resin couldn't be used in their league.

The whole controversy seems silly and it causes one to wonder why business men with so much money invested can be so petty. The public cannot have much respect for the rulings of magnates who will argue that in day time just because the other fellows said it was right.

It has developed since the ball players started gathering for spring training that the pitchers don't give a darn whether they can use resin or not and that many of them are opposed to it.

FEES IN YOSEMITE PARK ARE REDUCED

YOSEMITE, Cal., March 10 (U.P.)—Reduction in automobile entrance fees to Yosemite national park has been made by the Department of the Interior, according to word received here.

In place of the \$5 automobile fee as charged in previous years, motorists entering Yosemite this year will be charged \$3 for a season's permit that will allow their coming and going as many times during the year as desired, without the payment of additional entrance fees.

A new automobile permit station will be opened at the Hog Ranch Ranger Station, on the Hetch Hetchy automobile road, a new route that became available last fall with the removal of the Hetch Hetchy railroad between Mather station and the Hetch Hetchy damsites. No other changes are contemplated in location of automobile permit stations.
