MONSTER PLANE CARRYING DIRIGIBLE WILL BE BUILT

AKRON, Ohio, March 11. - A gigantic warship of the air practically double the size of the Shenandoah and the Los Angeles, designed to carry four to six combat airplanes, will soon be constructed here according to the announcement of Good-year-Zeppelin Corporation officials.

Blue print plans for the new air monster were worked out in cooperation with Rear Admiral W. A. Moffet, chief of the naval bureau of aeronautics.

Improved and modernized structural details together with many new general features is expected to make the contemplated airship the strongest and fastest aircraft ever constructed.

To make possible the building of the control cabin and all the power-car units inside the ship itself, triple keels will be utilized extending throughout the entire length, thus assuring greater sturdiness to the ship's hull.

The designers regard this as a vital factor to remove the possibility of loss of an engine or control car while flying and at the same time to eliminate considerable air resistance, adding, naturally, to the speed of the airship.

HUNTLEY EXPLAINS TAX REGULATIONS

PORTLAND, Ore., March 11. - Clyde D. Huntley, collector of internal revenue, finds that hundreds of taxpayers are confused as to the provisions of the new income tax law and are unable to determine whether or not they should file returns of income this year.

For the information and guidance of taxpayers, Collector Huntley today issued the following statement: "Income tax returns must be filed on or before March 15 by the following:

"Every existing partnership, regardless of amount of income; "Every existing corporation, regardless of amount of income; "Every single (unmarried) individual having a net income of \$1500, or more; "Every married individual having a personal or a joint net income of \$2500, or more; "Every individual having a gross income of \$5,000, or more, regardless of the net income; "Extensions for filing returns will be granted ONLY under the following conditions:

"To individuals, whose net income amounts to \$5,000, or more, and to domestic corporations, PROVIDED A TENTATIVE RETURN IS FILED ON OR BEFORE MARCH 15, showing estimated tax, accompanied by the payment of one-fourth of the estimated tax. "Individuals, whose net income does not exceed \$5,000, may secure an extension by applying to the collector of internal revenue, prior to March 15, and then ONLY in case of sickness or absence from the state of the taxpayer."

USES WOODEN LEG FOR HIDING DRUGS

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 11. - Hidden in a recess of the cork leg worn by William Cummings, drug peddler arrested at Turk and Fillmore streets, arresting officers yesterday found 16 cubes of morphine, according to their report.

In a preliminary search of Cummings, eight cubes of the drug were found; but on closer inspection at city prison, police found 16 more cubes in a specially prepared cavity in the man's artificial leg. Cummings was arrested by J. F. McCarthy and Charles Moehrie, of the State Board of Pharmacy, and Police Detective Arthur Morrison. He is held for violation of the State poison law.

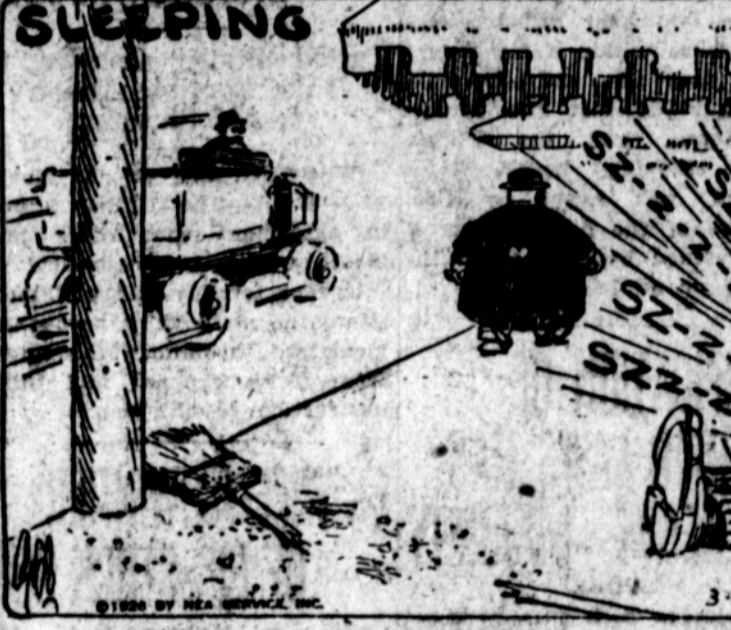
