### ASHLAND STUDENTS TAKE BIG PART IN O. A. C. LIFE

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, March 11—Ashland is represented by 12 of the 3512 students registered at the college, Jackson county having 68 students. All these young people are making a creditable showing in their college work and are represented in many of the activities on the campus.

Other towns in Jackson county and the corresponding number of students representing them are: Applegate, 1; Central Point, 3; Gold Hill, 2; Medford, 34; Phoenix, 2; Rogue River, 4; Sam's Valley, 1; and Talent, 4.

The total registration in the college, including summer session and short course students, is 4898. The extension service, in addition, takes the college to thousands of Oregonians.

Hugh Bates is a sophomore in pharmacy and is president of Phi Chi, local social fraternity. He is also on the staff of the Orange Owl, the college comic magazine.
