

JUVENILE HOSPITAL FOR GIRLS TO BE BUILT SOON

A statewide campaign to raise \$50,000 to complete the Juvenile Hospital for Girls, as part of the splendid work that has been carried on by the Louise Home for the past 15 years has begun, with representatives of the project by prominent men and women leaders of the state.

No greater or more worthwhile health measure has ever been attempted in these sections, and the hospital should have the loyal support of every American, as no one knows when the disease will strike. It is for the purpose of continuing and expanding the work the Louise Home has done in fighting and curing venereal diseases in girls from 4 to 19 years of age that the new hospital is being built. The present hospital is inadequate to cope with the disease, as it cares for but 16 girls. The new hospital, bearing completion at Elwood station, near Troutdale, on the 22-acre property of the Louise Home, will, if Oregon's men and women help, be opened June 1.

The hospital will accommodate 50 patients. There will be 20 single rooms, two 10-bed wards, segregating and receiving rooms, operating rooms, laboratory, lecture hall and classrooms to teach the young women how to care for themselves and to carry on their school studies while they are receiving necessary treatment. The studies are conducted by the county school superintendent. Hundreds of cases of little girls, some as young as 13 being mothers, have been saved from blindness, feeble-mindedness and other afflictions, and restored to the social world. It is to take their places as citizens in the economic structure. The Juvenile Hospital does

not depend on charity. Watchfulness with its cures, it has a fine system of follow-up work and preventative measures, so that the victims will get the proper start in good environments.

Some of the cases, which have come from all parts of the state, are voluntary matters after health, while the majority are court commitments, hence the request on the part of the organization that all residents of the state help finance this most needed institution. It is a safeguard against their own and their children's health, say the officers of the hospital.

The 1935 legislature endorsed it by appropriating \$17,500. The state outside of Multnomah county is asked for \$35,000. Multnomah county's quota is \$25,000. Field workers will make a vigorous campaign in every county, and all Oregonians are asked to help fight the dread disease by sending contributions promptly. The hospital is being conducted under the auspices of the Pacific Protective Society, and Mrs. R. E. Beaudant as part of her contribution to this statewide work has volunteered her services as campaign chairman.

This is a project that no one can afford to overlook, as no one can tell when it will strike home. These venereally infected girls must be saved, and the departments of the Governor of the state, the Mayor of Portland, Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner of the state hospital; Dr. Henry B. Cliff, Multnomah county physician; Dr. R. B. Dilligant, head of the U. of O. Medical school; Judge Jacob Kessler of the juvenile court; Dr. Frederick Stricker and Dr. John G. Abelle, state and city health officers;

CROWN PRINCE OF SWEDEN TO VISIT

STOCKHOLM, March 14—(U. P.)—The Crown Prince and Crown Princess of Sweden leave Gothenburg on the 16th of May in the Swedish motor passenger liner Gripsholm for a two-month visit to the United States.

They are following an invitation to be present at the unveiling of the John McKinney monument in Washington on the 29th of June and wish to use this opportunity to visit different parts of the country.

Both of them look forward to

the journey to the states with the greatest interest. They have never before visited North America, and are especially anxious to see the country and where so many Swedes have found a second home.

On the 16th of May the Gripsholm monument, a statue placed in the Forsman Park near the Gripsholm monument, will be solemnly unveiled by the president with the Crown Prince and Crown Princess as chief guests.

From Washington, where the president will entertain them, their Royal Highnesses will return to New York for a few days stay and for visits to Philadelphia and Edison, and then they will start for a tour in motor

car through the Eastern States, visiting West Point, New Haven, Yale, Newport, Worcester and Boston. From there they will continue to Niagara, make a tour to Detroit, go on to Chicago, Minneapolis and St. Paul.

Their itinerary then takes them to Yellowstone Park, Phelps Lake, Rich Springs, Lake City, Cedar City, Elmer National Park, Grand Canyon, Los Angeles and Sequoia National Park. Towards the end of July, the Crown Prince and Crown Princess will arrive in San Francisco, from where they will leave for home by way of Japan, China and India.

The Crown Prince is now 14 years of age. He was married in 1920, and has a daughter of 10 months. His mother, the present Queen, Princess Louise, princess of Battenberg, died a cousin of King George, in 1923.
