### SCOTT'S BLUFF, Neb., March

17. — (LP) — Besides representing his district in congress, Robert G. Simmons, representative from the sixth Nebraska district, is keeping the residents of his district informed on what congress is doing this session.

Each week, Congressman Simmons prepares a lengthy letter, outlining what he has done and what reaction it brought from congress for all of the newspapers in his district. The letter is also read over radio station KFKX at Hastings, Neb.

Although Simmons' district comprises the sparsely settled regions of western Nebraska, his local followers claim they are better informed on what their congressman is doing in Washington, D. C., than any other congressional district in the United States.

## BRETHREN'S CHURCH TO HOLD CONVENTION

LINCOLN, Neb., March 17. — (LP) — Clergymen and laymen of the Church of the Brethren from all parts of America will convene here June 9 to 15 to discuss the power of present-day religion.

More than 10,000 clergymen and laymen from the United States, Canada and England will attend the conference, which is the first to be held in the middle west by the Church of the Brethren since 1901.

A movement to strengthen the church against attacks made against it by educating the laymen will be launched at the conference, according to Albert Wiedeman, dean of Bethany Bible School of Chicago, who is arranging the program for the meeting.

Among the speakers at the meeting will be Prof. R. W. Schlosser of Elizabethtown College.

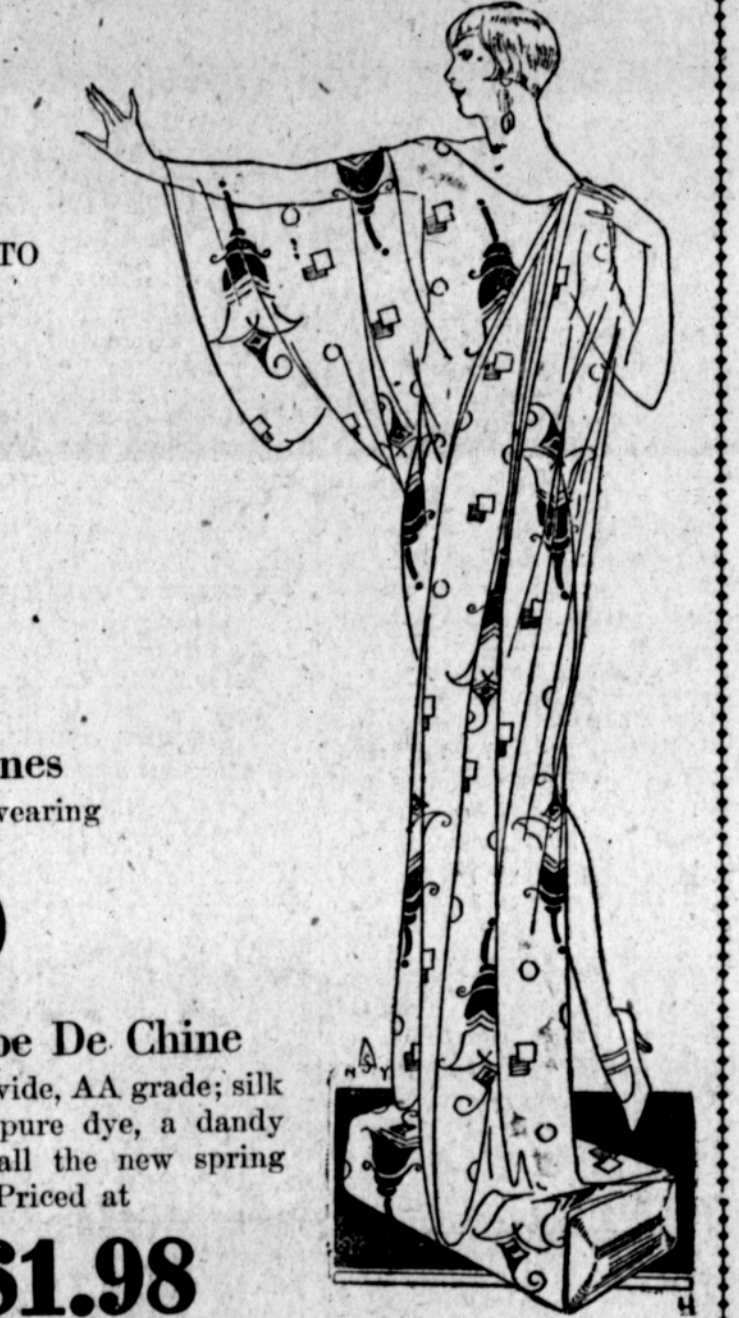
