THE CHAMBER PRIMARY

As a result of the poor response of chamber of commerce members in the primary election which closed Tuesday evening, it is the belief of The Tidings that some other method should be adopted in the selection of nominees for the board of directors.

Out of approximately 300 members, only 65 voted for directors. And more startling still as the fact that 112 names were suggested by those who cast their ballots for the 12 nominees.

The Tidings believes that the 12 men who were nominated are representative of the community, and any six of them, or any of them for that matter, are fully competent to aid in directing the affairs of the chamber.

Other chamber of commerce organizations have attempted the primary system of balloting and have found it to be a failure. There is not the interest that is manifested in the method of nominating from the floor at a general meeting of the entire membership.

The primary system, no doubt, would prove entirely feasible and would arouse the needed interest if there were some plan by which members could or would announce their candidacies prior to the primary election.

The Tidings suggests that the new directors, when they are elected, give serious consideration to some sensible and workable plan whereby more interest will be aroused in the chamber of commerce elections.

It was a venerable old-timer who made the suggestion yesterday that the chamber of commerce and The Tidings might do a bit of good work by advertising Ashland to the world as the "Honeymoon Town."
