TICKET WILL BE SELECTED AT GATHERING

Republican Meeting Plans For March 30 Announced by Committee

CANDIDATES INVITED

No Endorsements Will be Made For State or Federal Nominations

Jackson county politics promises to get under way at Medford on March 30 when the proposed pre-primary convention of Jackson county republicans will be held. This convention will endorse candidates for county offices but will withhold endorsements for state or federal offices.

The following call and outline of policies was announced today by the republican county central committee:

The Republican County Central Committee has called a representative delegate convention to be held in Medford, March 30, 1926. This convention will write and adopt a platform. This document will set forth what the republican party of Jackson county believes to be the important issues of the campaign, and all republicans will be expected to accept and defend it; knowing the high and unselfish character of the individuals that go to make up the republican party in this county we can say with confidence that no unsound or unworthy plank will appear in this platform.

This year there are four important offices to be filled—one state senator, two state representatives, and one county commissioner.

Recommendations

One of the purposes of this convention is to recommend candidates for these offices to the republican voters in the May primary. We shall make no recommendations for national or state offices, believing that to be the prerogative of state and congressional conventions.

We invite all candidates for these four offices, who believe in representative government and party responsibility to submit their claims and qualifications to this convention, it being understood on a question of honor that they will loyally abide by the decision of the convention and actively support the ticket recommended.

There may be candidates who do not wish to ask endorsement by this convention, but do expect to enter the race through the direct primary in the usual way. This is their right, which will not be questioned. All candidates desiring to appear before this convention are asked to file such intention in writing to J. W. Wakefield, chairman Republican County Committee, not later than March 24, 1926.

CHARLES R. FORBES ON WAY TO PRISON

Forbes, former lieutenant-colonel in the army, head of the Veterans' Bureau, and confident of President Harding, arrived here today on his way to Leavenworth prison to start a two year sentence on a charge of conspiracy to defraud the government.

DEATH OF PRESIDENT AGED FATHER

Colonel John C. Coolidge Succumbs at Family Home in Plymouth

FUNERAL PLANS MADE

Will Be Buried Tomorrow Afternoon; Son Arrives This Morning

PLYMOUTH, Vt., March 19—(U.P.)—Colonel John C. Coolidge, father of the president, died at 10:41 o'clock last night after a valiant battle against paralysis for the past several months. Colonel Coolidge was conscious until a short time before the end, and died without apparent pain.

It was thought the revolver was for Frank Fallon, considered one of the most dangerous convicts in the institution.

Klamath Indians Will Get Payment

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Mar. 19—(Special)—Word was received here today from Washington, D. C., that a payment of \$200 to every Indian on the Klamath Indian reservation has been authorized and will be forthcoming within the next few days. Payments to the Klamath tribe for the sale of reservation timber are made twice a year, but it is believed here that larger payments will be made during the present year.

Colorful Pioneer Is Dead In Utah
