Kenneth McKintosh of Supreme Court Suggested For McCamant Post

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 23-(U.P.)-Judge Kenneth Mc-Kintosh of the Washington supreme court was proposed to President Coolidge today by Senator Jones, as a successor to Wallace McCamant of Portland on the federal circuit court of appeals.

McCamant's nomination was rejected by the senate after he had served a recess appointment prior to the convening of congress. Judge McKintosh has served on the Washington supreme bench for the past 12 years. He formerly was prosecuting attorney of King county.
