TOLEDO, Ohio, March 23.—(U.P.)—"There is no reason for alarm. They're the same boys and girls." Professor Judge O. B. O'Donnell declared in an interview here on the "younger generation."

Speaking on this "Much ado about nothing," Judge O'Donnell said: "We've had a lot of time-saving inventions, and our young folks have just kept up with them."

"The modern youth and girl moves a bit faster, that's all," he thinks.

"You ought to have heard what their parents said about the 'Sally Waters' when it was introduced 25 years ago," reminded the probate judge, referring to a dance of that name and comparing it with our present "Charleston" craze.

"People were as greatly criticized dancing the 'Sally Waters' back in 1901, as they are of the Charleston today."

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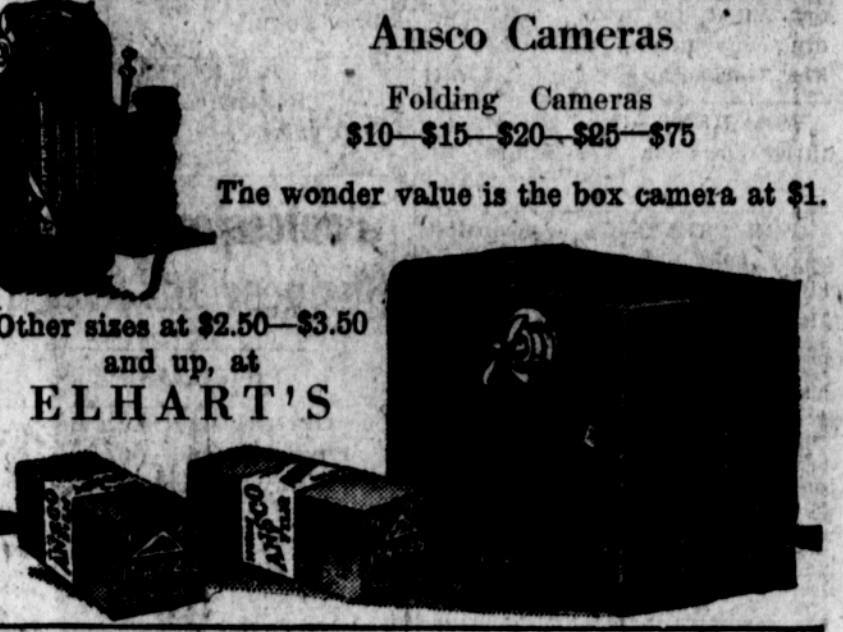

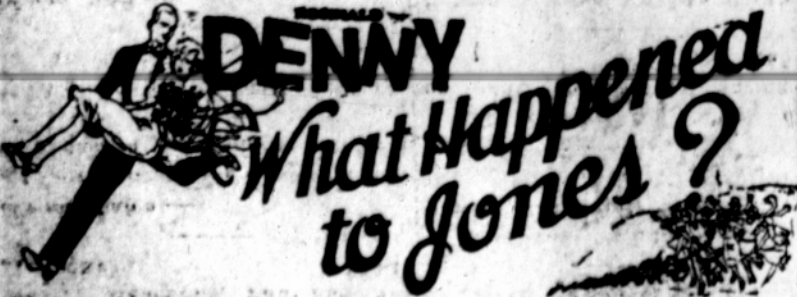
