POLITICS

To the Editor Ashland Tidings:
The war came to an end in the fall of 1918. It was not until 1920 that the American people began to dimly realize the appalling size of the indebtedness that they had incurred; that we had not only financed our own part in the war, but had advanced billions of dollars to our allies. These great expenditures were no doubt necessary and proper war measures, but to our disgust we found that the wasters and spenders that had sprung up around the war administration were still shovelling out the money and that the nations to whom we had extended credit were either unable or unwilling to make settlements. Deflation set in, unemployment increased, trade and business fell off.
In 1920 Harding was elected on a platform pledged to bring the nation back to normalcy by ceasing all war time activities, reducing expenditures, increasing revenues, and by giving American labor and American industries adequate tariff protection. As soon as the new administration got into action the country was put on a budget basis and measures were taken to carry out all of these pledges.
In 1923 came the death of President Harding who was succeeded by Vice President Coolidge. It seems to me that this nation is fortunate above all others in the world today in having for its chief executive a fiscal-conservative in thrift and economy. It is an extravagant and profligate age. The example of President Coolidge's simple living and modest common sense is purifying and strengthening to us as a nation.
President Coolidge, in carrying out his policy of retrenchment, has at times considered it his duty to oppose the appropriation of large sums of money for special or extraordinary purposes, although these expenditures might be demanded by large and influential groups. An example of this was his opposition to the Soldiers Bonus or Soldiers Adjusted Compensation bill.
In 1920, and directly thereafter, Robert N. Stanfield at the solicitation of the ex-service men of the state, promised to work and vote for a Soldiers Compensation measure. At that time practically the whole population of the state looked with more or less favor on legislation along that line. However, by 1923 formidable opposition had developed against a bonus measure; not alone among the non-soldier population but to a lesser degree among the ex-service men themselves.
Under these circumstances Senator Stanfield found himself in a difficult position—criticized by many, petitioned and importuned by thousands (myself among the number), to support President Harding who was constantly reminded by the ex-service men of his pledge to them.
Senator Stanfield believes in representative party government and responsible leadership. His disposition and inclination at all times is to give loyal support to the head of his party. Now, what did he do in this dilemma? He did what a weaker man might have side-stepped. He took his medicine. He voted for the bill and voted to pass it over the President's veto. Now, what are the ex-service men in Jackson County going to do about it? Ingratitude is one of the commonest human sins, but I can't think that these young ex-service men are going to put themselves in a position to be accused. It will be of absorbing interest to watch how the primary vote for Senator comes out of the ballot box in May.
