BIBLE INSTITUTION NEARS COMPLETION

BERKELEY, Cal., March 24.—(U.P.)—A new translation of the prophecies of Isaiah, on the basis of a correct Hebrew text, has been completed by Dr. William Popper, University of California, who believed Bible controversies are ridiculous and the result of ignorance.

Dr. Popper is chairman of the department of Semitic languages at the university here. In his translation, he has attempted to preserve the rhythm and spirit of the original.

"No language," Dr. Popper said, "can be accurately translated into any other. The majority of quibblers know only the English version, and are not qualified to discuss the Bible's real merits.

"A great deal of theological discussion is carried on by theo-

logians who do not know Semitic languages, and have no more than a second or third hand version of the Bible. They argue about the meaning of a text and know nothing about the language in which it was written."

EGG LAYING BOOMS
WASHINGTON REPORTS
WASHINGTON, March 24.—(U.P.)—Hens worked overtime for farmers last year and produced 15,500,000 cases of eggs, an increase of 1 per cent over the number laid in 1924, the

official records of the Agriculture Department show.
The total value of chickens hatched on farms last year was about 12 per cent greater than in 1924 and the average chick produced was worth 7 per cent more in price.
