To the Editor Ashland Tidings:

Six years ago the United States outlawed the traffic in liquor by Constitutional amendment. It was the greatest experiment in summary legislation ever attempted by a live people. About fifty years of discussion had convinced a large majority that the licensed liquor business was not only a profi-

gous waste of human values, but that it was the cleaning sense through which all the vice and weakness of humanity were commercialized. Continuing of effort to make the liquor business decent by regulation had entirely failed. The only course left open to a self-governing people was to decree its extinction by law. This they attempted to do by the passage of the Eighteenth Amendment.

Every dry optimist who imagined that the battle was won

and John Barleycorn, knocked out for keeps is due for a rude awakening. The fact is that the last phase of this half century campaign is just now getting under way. It might be well for the enemies of the commercialized liquor traffic in Jackson County to take stock at this time—to consider and reflect for a moment.

Who are the men who have helped to write prohibition into the laws of Oregon and into the National statutes, and can these men be depended upon to strengthen and uphold the law in the future?

Robert N. Stanfield was elected Senator from Oregon in 1920. On the record he has made as senator his friends are asking that he be renominated for a second term of six years. There are few men in the history of the United States Senate who have attained the positions of power and influence in their first term that Senator Stanfield has. He is Chairman of the Public Lands Committee; to this powerful committee the people of the eleven Western public land states are looking for relief from burdensome taxation imposed by Federal withdrawal from the tax rolls of vast areas of our public domain.

Senator Stanfield is a member of the Committee on Post Offices and Post Roads; he is an influential member of the Senate Finance Committee, probably the most powerful committee in the National Congress. Of this Committee Senator Aldrich said he would rather be the chairman than to be the President of the United States.

It was a red letter day when the growing, developing State of Oregon exchanged a likeable,
