 stopping a train on the Moffat
 road.

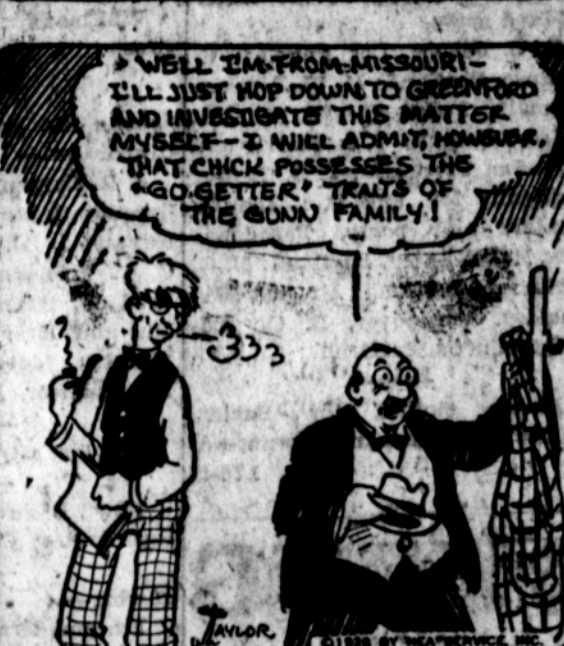
