Oregon Caves to Open—Opening of the Oregon Caves for tourist traffic will occur a month and a half ahead of the official season this year, states Manager George C. Sabin today. Guide service will be inaugurated on Thursday, with regular trips through the caves daily at 1 o'clock. Other trips will be arranged if there is a sufficient number to warrant the trips into the caverns. Within two weeks, regular accommodations will be available at the Oregon Caves resort, Manager Sabin now making the arrangements for the opening of the dining room and cottages. 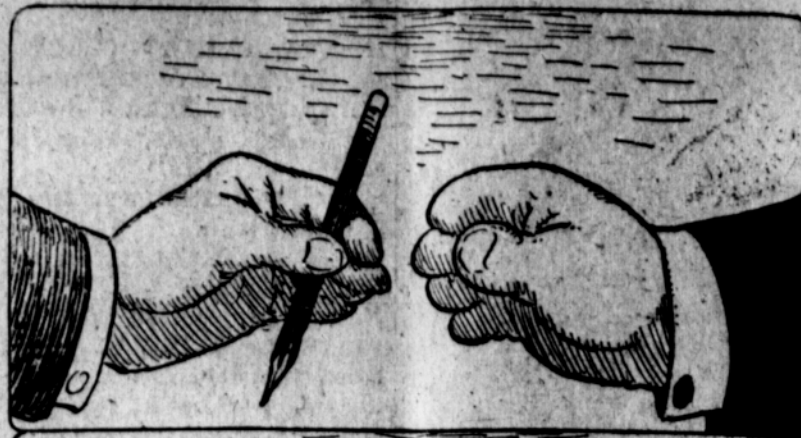

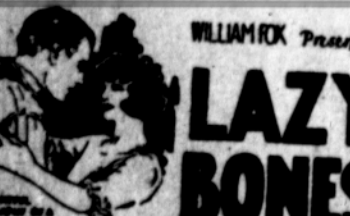
