ASHLAND AUTO CLUB MAY BE FORMED SOON

A. A. A. Members in This City Start Movement To Organize

PURPOSES OUTLINED

Better Uniformity in Regulations is Object Sought by Sponsors

Tentative plans were under way today to form an Ashland Automobile club from among the local membership of the Oregon State Automobile association, and it is understood that a meeting will be called for some evening next week at the Lithia Springs hotel. The purpose of the organization primarily will be to sound out sentiment of automobile owners concerning the numerous automobile and traffic laws and making suggestions as to what the motorists of this section desire in the way of new laws or repeal of existing laws.

Plan Definite Program

Jack Milton of Jackson Hot Springs, E. W. Price of the Lithia Springs hotel, and several others are leading the movement which is expected to result in some definite announced program within the next few days.

It was also suggested that in order to get the best possible good from the state association and A. A. A. organization, the local members would urge association members in other cities of the state to organize similar clubs in order that the full membership of the association would cooperate in urging uniformity in all highway and automobile laws and regulations.

Sponsors of the movement announced today that a call for such a gathering would be issued early next week, and they were hopeful that A. A. A. members generally in Ashland would take a genuine interest in the proposal.

CLEAN UP DAY WILL BE HELD APRIL 12

Residents of City Urged to Cooperate in Cleaning up Premises

Monday, April 12, has been officially designated as clean-up day by Mayor Johnson, and citizens of Ashland are urged by city officials to cooperate in cleaning up their premises and getting the city's front yards and back yards in good shape for the summer months.

As is the annual custom, the city will furnish trucks and wagons for hauling away all refuse free of charge.

The clean-up day was first set for next Monday but was postponed for a week because of Easter Sunday.

Mayor Johnson said this probably would be the last year that the clean-up day would be held under the present system.

Baby Chicks To Get Protection Easter Sunday

With the approach of Easter and the rabbit and baby chick tradition that accompanies it, the Oregon Humane society is redoubling its vigilance to prevent illegal shipment of baby chicks for display and sale for Easter celebration purposes. Up to a few years ago it was customary to display cute baby chicks in store windows for a few days before Easter and fond parents would buy one or two of the little peepers and carry them home to their flat or apartment to impress the children with the charm of the great religious festival. Ordinarily the baby chick would be petted to death on the first day or starved to death on the third day when the newness had worn off, and almost without fail the ultimate destination of the baby chick which had been toted home to celebrate the resurrection was the garbage dump via the ash can.

ENTIRE CREW SAVED BY BRITISH TANKER

NEW YORK CITY, April 1.—(U.P.)—The story of how a small British tanker, the Shirvan, rescued 37 officers and men of the steamer Laleham while the fastest of all, ocean-going vessels, the Mauretania, was speeding to the scene, was told here today by radiogram to the United Press.

COUNTERFEIT DUO SENT TO PENITENTIARY

Portland Men Plead Guilty to Making Spurious Half Dollars

WAS FIRST OFFENSE

Charles Bentley and C. A. Palmgren Will go to McNeil Island

PORTLAND, Ore., April 1.—(U.P.)—Federal Judge Bean yesterday sentenced Caleb A. Palmgren to two years and Charles A. Bentley to 13 months in McNeil island penitentiary when they admitted the possession and manufacture of false coins. They are the first counterfeiters to be brought into court here in several months.

Neither Palmgren nor Bentley is experienced in counterfeiting. Assistant United States Attorney Littlefield said, and it apparently was their first "job". The heavier sentence for Palmgren was recommended on the grounds that he was the leading spirit.

Both men, while admitting the manufacture of the coins, denied having passed any in Portland. According to the government, they apparently were preparing to do so when captured. Their arrest took place last Friday when secret service operatives, working on a "tip" found nine counterfeit 50-cent pieces, molds and other paraphernalia in a rooming house at No. 324 1-2 First street and later connected Bentley and Palmgren with the evidence. Both men are said to have confessed at the time of their arrest.

UNCLE IS HELD AS NEPHEW'S MURDERER

Minnesota Man is Charged With Poisoning Five-Year-Old Boy

FAIRMONT, Minn., April 1.—(U.P.)—A charge of first degree murder was filed here today against Arthur Goerndt for the death of his nephew, Raymond, aged 5, early last December. The mother of the child swore to the complaint. The lad's body was exhumed some time ago, when traces of poison were found in the intestinal organs.

MILITARY TRAINING IS BEGUN IN JAPAN

All Students Between 16 and 20 Years Compelled to Take Work

TOKIO, April 1.—(U.P.)—Approximately a half million Japanese students between 16 and 20 years of age began a course in military training today. Each school and college in Japan will provide military instruction, starting at 16 years of age, and 800 such hours will be given before the students are 20 years old.

He would not say that his opposition is directed against the Dollar line.

French Official Opposes Oil Grab

PARIS, April 1.—(U.P.)—Finance Minister Peret today asked the chamber of deputies to suppress the article in the financial program which provides for a French oil monopoly. Peret explained that such a monopoly might cause foreign complications. It is known that Standard Oil protested to Washington against the proposed monopoly.

FARM RELIEF MEASURES TO GET SHUNTED

Senate Republicans Find no Place for it on Schedules Program

FARMERS UP IN ARMS

Agricultural Bloc Will Demand Speedy Action on Many Measures

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 1.—(U.P.)—The legislative program of the administration majority in the senate has given no place to farm relief legislation, and the senatorial farm bloc is up in arms, it was revealed today.

Under an agreement reached by the republican steering committee, the Italian debt, the Brookhart and Steek contest, the public buildings bill, the railway conciliation measure, the McFadden banking bill and the Morrow air service proposals will be taken up in consecutive order.

Whether or not the farm bloc can muster sufficient strength to break in on this program is not known, but it is considered extremely doubtful.

Jones was rescued by a passerby who heard his cries for help. According to the police Jones was drunk when he was pulled out of the water. He kept crying, "Minnie, Minnie," and tried to leap back into the water.

PORTLAND THIEF IS MARRIED IN OREGON

Franklin Delbrano Caught as He Breaks Into Jewelry Store Window

SPOKANE, Wash., April 1.—(U.P.)—Franklin Delbrano, aged 20, of Portland, was jailed here today when he was caught breaking the glass window of a jewelry store and scooping up valuable gems. He fled through a hail of shots, scattering the jewels in all directions before he was captured.

HEALTH BODY STARTS DRIVE FOR MEMBERS

Campaign Gets Under Way Today And Continues Until April 15th

DOES SPLENDID WORK

Jackson County Public Health Association Lists Activities

A drive for new members was launched today by the Jackson County Public Health association and will continue until April 5. Local workers are taking the field in an effort to interest citizens generally in the work of the health association. Dues for one year are placed at 50 cents. The county association is divided into eight active groups, and it is through the cooperation of these groups that the health officers and nurses receive the assistance of the public at large. Each of these groups will handle its own campaign for renewing old memberships and procuring new ones.

Assists Officials

These groups are located in Ashland, Medford, Jacksonville, Central Point, Gold Hill, Talent and Rogue River. The association cooperates with the county health officer, county nurses and school nurses in the following activities, contact with all tuberculosis cases, stimulate health education, rural and migratory family sanitation, quarantine for epidemics, infant, prenatal and pre-school hygiene, physical inspection of all school children and free clinics.

Provides Necessities

The association also provides milk, medical supplies, X-ray examinations, clothes and bedding to patients and has charge of the Christmas Seal sales each year. The money to carry on these varied activities comes only from the memberships and the Christmas Seal sales.

LOCAL POSTOFFICE SHOWS BIG GROWTH

Receipts for First Three Months This Year Are Greater Than Last

Receipts of the Ashland postoffice for the first three months of 1926, ending yesterday, show an increase of approximately 25 per cent over the corresponding period in the first quarter of last year.

This was indicated today from the preliminary figures contained in the quarterly report of Postmaster Wagner, and indicates the substantial growth of Ashland during the past year.

Mount Lassen Is Active Once More

RED BLUFF, Cal., April 1.—(U.P.)—Residents of Red Bluff and vicinity yesterday witnessed another eruption of smoke and steam from Mount Lassen, which is believed to be the "outlet" of the eruption also was visible in the United States.
