HILTY IS GIVEN NEW LICENSE ON POOLROOM

City Council by Unanimous Vote, Rescinds Former Action Taken

GETS ANOTHER CHANCE

Sewer Petition Filed; Fairview Street Sidewalk Lane is Mowed

At the earnest solicitation of Henry Enders, Sr., in which he urged that the city "return good for evil," the council last night voted to grant a pool room license to A. Hilty on A street, whose right to operate a pool room was taken from him the first of the year.

Mayor Johnson placed himself on record as being opposed to the action, declaring that Hilty had deceived the council once and might be expected to do it again. Councilmen Wright and Wiley both talked against pool room licenses in general, but said they felt Hilty should be given another chance—his last chance. Councilman Wiley said he would never vote for any pool room license again as long as he is a member of the city council, while Councilman Wright said he would never again vote to restore a license after it was once taken away.

WASHINGTON, April 7—(U.P.)—Nine army airplanes, 14 parachutes, nine spare Liberty motors and various other aerial equipment have been loaned by the war department to the agriculture department for the forest fire patrol on the Pacific coast. It was announced today. The equipment is now at Crissy Field, San Francisco.
