CHAPLAIN CLAMPITT TRIAL IS RESUMED

Army Officer Accused of Intimacy With Girl Seeks More Evidence

SAN FRANCISCO, April 6. — (AP) — Chaplain Orville I. Clampitt, U. S. A., again will face a courtmartial board here tomorrow at the resumption of his trial on charges of intimacies with Miss Lucille Swallow, Kansas farmer's daughter.
The hearing has been adjourned for six weeks while counsel for the chaplain accumulated documentary evidence in his behalf.
With Miss Swallow's testimony in the records and the girl returned to her home, the remainder of the trial is expected to be devoid of sensations. It is predicted the case may be concluded by the end of the week.
Chaplain Clampitt, who has a wife and family at Vancouver barracks, Washington, is alleged to have been indiscreet with Miss Swallow when he was stationed at Fort Leavenworth last year.

WOMEN WILL WAGE LIVING COST WAR

WASHINGTON, April 7.—(U. P.)—A plan of action to force down living costs when prices are deemed too high, will be devised by the National League of Women Voters, representing nearly 1,000,000 women in this country, at the seventh annual convention to be held in St. Louis next week.
A committee headed by Mrs. T. Baldwin, of Washington, has been making a study of the cost of living and will report before the convention. An open conference will be held on the subject and plans decided upon for keeping the cost of living on a reasonable level, if possible.
