Klamath Falls, a past State Regent of California and Mrs. W. M. Van Scoyoc, Regent of Crater Lake Chapter each responded felicitously.

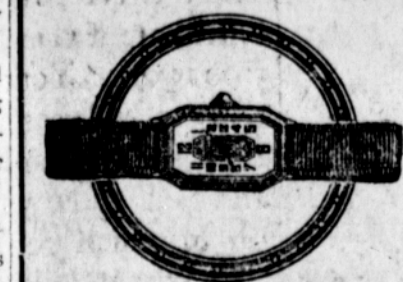
