## NEW TRAFFIC GUIDE GIVES RUNNING TIME

R. W. Price Evolves New Plan to Aid Auto Tourists Along Highway

## DISTANCES IGNORED

New Cards to be Issued by Lithia Springs Hotel to All Visitors

Believing that the distance between Oregon and Pacific coast cities measured in actual running time rather than by mileage will appeal more to motorists, R. W. Price of the Lithia Springs hotel is having a novel traffic card printed which will give tourists and all other motorists the actual driving time between Ashland and cities north and south.

Mr. Price this spring has made the trip in his own car to all cities shown on the new traffic card and has figured out the mileage carefully, basing the Oregon mileage at 30 miles per hour and in California at 35 miles an hour.

## Accurate Time

"The card will give accurate time between the cities to those who stay within the law, while it probably will be a bit under the driving time of those who are used to speeding," said Mr. Price. "In my opinion, only by figuring out the actual driving time between cities can motorists work out a day's run, and for that reason I believe these new traffic cards will appeal to motorists generally."

## STROKE FATAL TO AGED WAR VETERAN

William P. Tooney Dies at His Ashland Home; Funeral Sunday

William P. Tooney died late yesterday afternoon at the family home, 248 Seventh street, following a stroke of paralysis which he suffered early yesterday morning. He was 82 years of age and a Civil war veteran. The funeral will be held at 2:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon from Stock's chapel, with Rev. Northridge of the Land Mark Baptist church officiating.

Mr. Tooney had lived in Ashland for the past four years, coming here from Central Point, where he had lived for 15 years. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Jeanette Tooney, and a sister and brother.

## LONE BANDIT ROBS VICTIM AT CEMETERY

Adam Beagle Held up by Highwayman South of Ashland Last Night

Three Dollars and Watch Taken By Robber Just Outside City Limits

A lone highwayman, masked and armed, held up and robbed Adam Beagle of this city shortly before 9 o'clock last night on the Pacific highway a short distance south of the city. Beagle lost about \$3 in silver and an Elgin watch.

Beagle was driving into the city in a Ford roadster when the highwayman appeared from the brush near the Mountain View cemetery and stopped him by waving a flashlight in the center of the road.

## Ordered to Alight

"Keep your back to me and stick your hands in the air," the highwayman commanded as he ordered his victim to alight from the vehicle.

With the revolver pressed against Beagle's back, he then searched his pockets for valuables. The robbery completed, the highwayman ordered Beagle to get back into the car and drive on into the city without stopping. He then backed off into the underbrush by the roadside and disappeared.

Beagle told Chief of Police McNabb that he could give but a meager description of the highwayman as it was dark at that point on the road and he was forced to keep his back to the man throughout the robbery.

## ORCHARDISTS START BATTLE ON INSECTS

The Dalles Growers Use Traps, Poison, Sprays And Other Means

THE DALLES, Ore., April 10. — (LP) — Traps, poison bait and spray are being used here to combat a cutworm invasion threatening local orchards. The pests have stripped foliage and blossoms from more than four acres of the Seufert ranch, and have done inestimable damage through out the county. Some orchardists are trapping and burning the worms, others are using an arsenate of lead spray, and still others are poisoning the pests with deadly bait.

To cap the party, bride and bridegroom were bundled into a mail truck and taken for a ride through the streets, to the accompaniment of tin cans, horns and other noise-making devices. This morning, J. Q. was still trying to find out how it all happened.

## Late Rides And Smoking Banned

SEATTLE, Wash., April 10. — The standards committee of the women's federation of the University of Washington here, which prescribes rules of conduct for co-eds, stated in a code of regulations Thursday that co-eds at the university are forbidden to go canoeing before 7 a. m. or after 9 p. m. They are not to hold or attend street dances, and must have chaperones at all mixed social affairs. The code stressed a ban against smoking.

## NEW AIR MAIL SERVICE WILL BE POSTPONED

Pasco to Elko Route Will Not be in Operation For Two Months

Need New Equipment

Failure of Planes to Arrive From Factory Causes Temporary Halt

PORTLAND, Ore., April 10. — (U.P.) — Due to a shortage of planes, the Pacific Northwest air mail service has been ordered suspended for 60 days. It started last Tuesday from Pasco to Boise and Elko, where it joined the transcontinental air mail.

The reason given was to permit Walter Varney, air mail contractor, to get his equipment in shape. Two of the six planes which Varney had ordered failed to arrive from the factory, and there were several minor accidents of the available planes since the service started.

Varney has given assurance that within 60 days the new planes will be in readiness and he can then start the daily air mail service without further interruption.

## HEALTH UNIT WILL HOLD FORUM LUNCH NEXT TUESDAY NOON

Miss Nevan Betz of Child Health Association to Be Speaker

The Jackson County Health Unit will conduct the chamber of commerce forum lunch at the Lithia Springs hotel Tuesday noon, it was announced today at the chamber offices.

Miss Nevan O. Betz of the American Child Health association who made a state-wide milk survey of Oregon last November, will be the chief speaker. She will be in Jackson county next week on an inspection tour and will talk on the relation of milk to public health.

The luncheon will be the first under the regime of O. F. Carson, newly elected president, and he will speak briefly, outlining the hopes and plans of the chamber during the coming year.

## FUGITIVE GRANTED EXECUTIVE PARDON

Man Who Escaped Jail 50 Years Ago Returns to Texas to Confess

AUSTIN, Tex., April 10. — (LP) — The compelling desire to meet death with his name cleared in the eyes of the law brought T. A. Calhoun, confederate veteran and fugitive from justice for nearly half a century, back to Texas to receive clemency from Governor Miriam A. Ferguson Thursday. He was pardoned.

## TEXAS OIL TANK IS HIT BY LIGHTNING

Another Fire Disaster Reported as a Result of Lightning Flash

LULING, Texas, April 10. — (U.P.) — A 55,000-barrel steel oil tank, which was fired by lightning during the night here, was burning itself out today. Workmen succeeded in draining off a large part of the crude oil stored in the tank and it is believed that there is no danger to the more than 30 other tanks on the farm.

## AIRPLANE ALASKAN HEADS NORTH AGAIN

Captain George Wilkins Carries Food to Others Who Are on Foot

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, April 10. — (U.P.) — Bearing another load of supplies for the projected flight to the north pole, the airplane Alaskan took off for Point Barrow today. Captain George Wilkins also carried food which he hopes to drop down to Malcom Smith's overland party. The men were reported in dire need of provisions as they pressed forward in an attempt to reach Point Barrow with equipment.

## PROHIBITION DECLARED TO HARM YOUTHS

High Canadian Officials Tell Senate Committee Their Own Views

## RESTRICTION FAVORED

Government Sales Urged; Labor Leader Pleads for Modification

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 10. — (LP) — Prohibition was tried in Canada and failed because it did not prohibit, but instead provoked crime and the demoralization of young people.

This was the testimony before the senate prohibition committee today as given by Sir William Stavert, formerly of the Quebec liquor commission, and F. W. Russell of the Manitoba Temperance society.

Restricted government sale has eliminated the evils, they said.

Prior to their appearance, John Sullivan, president of the New York federation of labor, pleaded for the modification of the Volstead act.

"Young boys and girls are being demoralized by present prohibition practices," he said. "A drunken youth, once scorned, is being made a hero among his comrades."

## STOLEN AUTO TRUCK RETURN TO OWNER

Whittle Transfer Company Gets Back Vehicle Found in Nevada

The Graham truck stolen about three months ago from the Whittle Transfer company and which was recovered 100 miles north of Reno several weeks ago, has been returned to the owners, and is now in the shop being re-conditioned.

The truck is believed to have been stolen by the notorious Weston gang, of alleged bandits who are now being sought throughout the Pacific coast. Police believed the truck was used by the gang in hauling stolen goods to a cache somewhere in the mountain regions of Nevada.
