General Report

About fifty percent of water pipe has been laid for Talent Irrigation water, which is thru inch, and some one and one quarter inch pipe.  
The main canal has been cleaned of all trash and earth, that has come into ditch since the water was turned out last fall. Cleaning of the ditch started at the city limits boundary on the east side of Ashland, and to Jessac Bailey's on west side.  
Some 1100 feet of one and one quarter inch black pipe was taken up on Soda Line, east of Ashland. There are some seven miles of this pipe which has never been used for any purpose, except what has been taken up and used at times. Some of this pipe will be used for extensions of the Talent Irrigation water, at different places along the system.

Two concrete turn out boxes have been completed along ditch. They are seven feet by three feet, and about eighteen inches deep. There will be seven when all are completed this year. They will convert the water from the ditch into the pipe line, and the water will be screened of all trash at the turn out box.  
One Cora fire hydrant, with steamer nozzle connection has been installed at the east corner of 4th and East Main Streets.  
The fire hydrants have been flushed, and all sewer blow offs opened at the heads of sewers. One sewer was cleaned of tree roots at the intersection of North Main and Laurel Sts.  
Recommendations

There is at present, considerable leak through the west half of the concrete wall of the lower Reservoir. Plans are now being drawn to conserve this water, and in addition to provide for the proper screening of all this water from this reservoir, into the pipe line by providing intakes. These plans will be ready for consideration within the next ten days or two weeks.  
It is requested, that authority be granted, to make proper appraisal of the City's water system, and to investigate thoroughly, and make necessary plans for the proper conservation and distribution, of the City's present water supply.

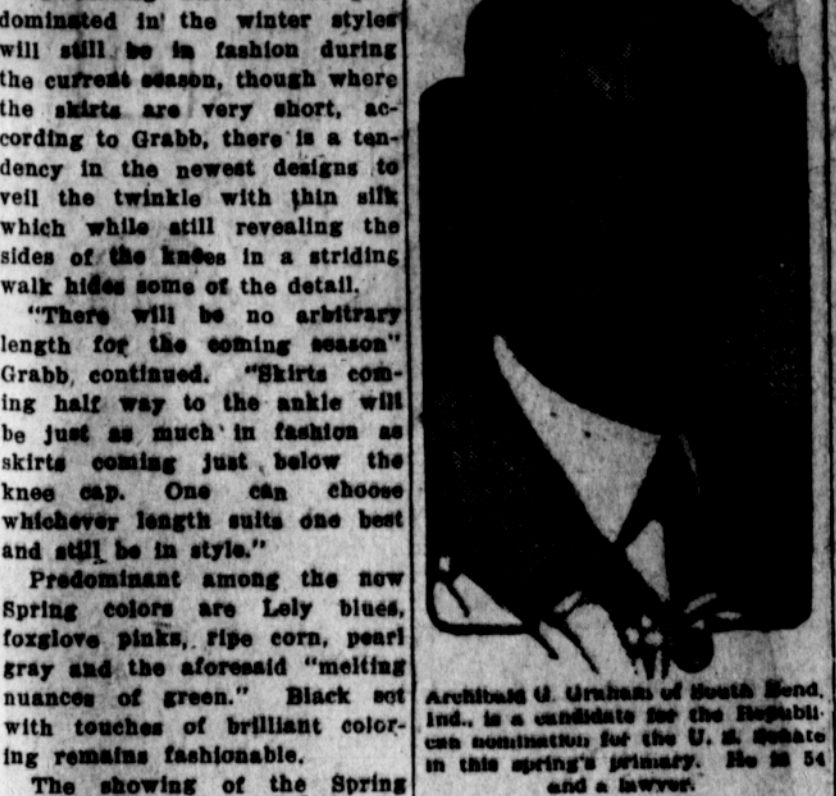
Plans are now being made for suitable flag, and it may be found advisable to purchase one at an estimated cost of approximately \$65.00. This will be reported on later.  
The new grader was assembled and placed in operation March 26th, and has proven very satisfactory in its operation. Approximately 10 miles of the total of 36 miles of streets that we have graded with the new grader in this time. It is found that we can do about 33 1-2 per cent more work with the new outfit, in addition to saving the labor of one man in the operation.

**NEW PASSING RULE IS NOT DISLIKED**

EUGENE, Ore., April 10—(U.P.)—The new football rules relative to the use of the forward pass will not have a great deal of influence on the game in changing it, Captain John J. McEwan, head coach of the University of Oregon, believes.  
McEwan was formerly a member of the football rules committee which announced the change. The new rule provides penalties for incompletes passes on second and third downs.  
"The rule will mean a team will be penalized some yardage—but a losing team can afford to take a chance of winning with a pass when the penalty is only a few yards if the pass fails. A few yards more or less is of little consequence to the losing team," according to McEwan.  
McEwan lost his place on the rules committee of the National Collegiate Athletic association when he left West Point, where he was head coach, to become coach at Oregon.
