State Highway Commission Will , Be Told of Urgent Needs Here

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., April 12-Ashland-Klamath Falls highway from Klamath Falls to the crest of Green Springs mountain should be oiled. It is a commercial as well as a tourist road and should have the preference over purely tourist high-

Urge Consideration The committee will urge the highway commission and the state highway engineer to serously consider the suggestion.

Already the commission has announced that the highway will be oiled from Klamath Falls to Keno, a distance of 12 miles. But so heavy is the traffic, that the committee believes it imperative that the road be oiled 35 miles farther to the crest of
