

Fight Started By Bryan Finds New Standard-Bearer

CLEARWATER, Fla., April 12.—The fight that lost its leader when William Jennings Bryan died has found a new standard-bearer. A new chieftain has arisen to take the place of the Great Commoner in the ranks of militant fundamentalism.
George F. Washburn, multimillionaire of Clearwater and Boston has taken for his own the ideals of Bryan. He has dedicated his life and his fortune to war on the teaching of evolution. And this is his battle-cry:
"Save the orthodox Bible from the onslaughts of modernism."
It was a year ago, before Bryan's death, that Washburn heard a sermon in a Clearwater church

about the fight to prevent the teaching of evolution in the schools. After Bryan's death he began to rally the dead leader's following, and in November of last year he held a big mass meeting here, where 3000 people heard him cry:
Dedicates Fortune to Task
"I hereby dedicate myself, my family and my fortune to the task of stamping out the theory of evolution and the teaching of anything disrespectful to the Holy Bible."
And the crusade was on again. Washburn's leadership is different from Bryan's. Bryan depended on his oratory to stir his followers. Washburn is applying to modern business methods, work-

ing as an organizer, and executive to weld together an efficient fighting machine.
The Bible Crusaders of America which has as its object the championing of the teaching of Genesis is the official name of his organization. He subscribed \$100,000 to its treasury at the beginning, and has promised \$100,000 more when it is needed. He has organized groups of workers who are invading various states with eloquence and pamphlets, always working for legislative action against the teaching of "Darwinism."

The organization recently concluded its campaign in Mississippi, and saw the legislation pass an "anti-monkey bill" such as it had hiked for. A crusade has been carried on in Florida, and the legislature is to consider a similar bill at its next session. Eventually the crusaders expect to campaign in every state in the union.
Secs-Movement Spread
"The Bible crusade is the biggest movement before America today," says Washburn. "It is a movement destined to spread over the entire universe before many months have passed. Sweden and Jugoslavia have already taken up the fight, with fierce battles raging at trials similar to the Scopes trial at Dayton last summer."
Washburn's genius for organization is evident in the way the crusaders are grouped. There are associate members, active members, a children's branch known as the Junior Crusaders, an organization of ministers and evangelists, a monthly magazine full of arguments and quotations.
Bryan is gone. But the last movement he led is still going forward. His friend and co-worker is carrying on.

ALIENS MAY APPEAL CITIZENSHIP CASES

Supreme Court Makes New Ruling in Deciding Eastern Litigation

WASHINGTON, April 13.—Aliens denied citizenship by federal district courts can appeal, the supreme court ruled today. The question was raised by the first circuit court of appeals, which had an appeal from Jacob John Tutun, denied citizenship by the Massachusetts federal district court because in 1918 Tutun, as a non-declarant alien, had claimed exemption from military duty.

MANY FAMILIES WILL COME TO OREGON DURING SUMMER

Gleaning the harvest the readers left is no modern farm process. As of old it yielded returns, so it is found valuable in measuring results of the land settlement work of the State and Portland Chambers of Commerce.

In addition to the 1500 settlers placed on farm lands by the land settlement department, bringing the state an investment of \$5,000,000, other people numbering 1500 signed questionnaires a year ago declaring their intention to come to Oregon. Convinced that many of these prospective Oregonians have actually arrived without taking time to stop in the Portland office, W. G. Ide, executive director of the land settlement work, inaugurated in the last few weeks a follow-up campaign sending a personal letter to the old home address of each one who signified his intention of coming to Oregon but who has not yet reported his arrival.

Preliminary results indicate that many eastern and middle-western farmers who corresponded with the department and received information made their own selection of farm homes in various sections of Oregon and are well satisfied with the change. From dozens of others is pouring in the assurance that their coming has merely been postponed pending the disposal of their farm holdings in the east.

From McMinnville comes word from L. E. Cabs, formerly of Bridgeport, Nebraska: "I have bought a chicken ranch and am well satisfied. We are surely pleased with the climate and have a good business. This summer we will raise about 3,000 white leghorn chickens which are now doing well."
Disposing of a 200 acre farm in Missouri, C. M. Chapman is temporarily located at Jefferson until he finds just what he wants in a diversified farm where he can raise wheat,

dairy cows, hogs and chickens.

Kalamazoo, Michigan, was the old home of O. V. Hawthorne who came to Oregon seeking mountains, timber land, good water and recreation for the sportsman. He has located in Harney county according to his correspondence.

Among the many who say they have not given up plans to come to Oregon permanently, are a father and son in Colorado who visited here last summer. "Oregon is an ideal country," they write, "and it has such courteous and friendly people. We stopped at Bend four days and at Woodburn. A man can't help but prosper if he will work as they do out there in most places."

Arkansas will yield a settler family to Oregon when Mr. and Mrs. Baum of Pine Bluff dispose of their holdings. In the meantime writes Mrs. Baum: "People are coming fast on their return from Florida. I have given all the west coast literature in my possession to them and to those going that way last fall."

Gleaning the fields for our settler crop promises a rich yield for Oregon.

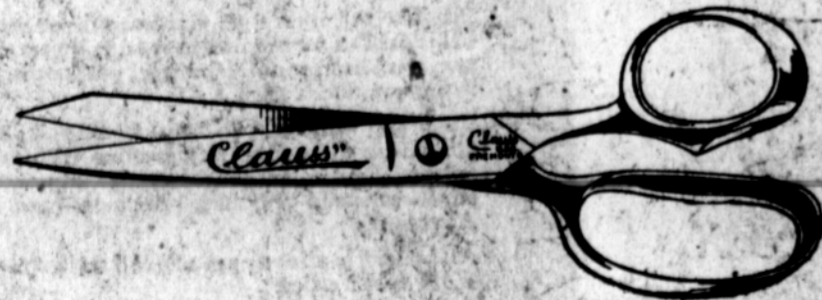
