BETTER HOMES WEEK CAMPAIGN PLANNED

The Better Homes campaign now being conducted in the Rogue River valley, as part of the nation-wide movement, and which culminates in Better Homes Week, April 25 to May 1, is an educational institution for public service, its aim being to make convenient, attractive and wholesome homes accessible

to all American families. Demonstrations are now being conducted by voluntary local committees all over the U. S. Campaigns also include lectures, discussion meetings, exhibits and wherever possible, during Better Homes Week, the demonstration of a house, planned and furnished for a family of modest means, illustrating the best the community can offer in home comfort, convenience, and beauty at a cost within the reach of families of moderate circumstances.

Chairmen and assistants have been appointed for the campaign in this section, committees are meeting and functioning with much success, a house for demonstration purposes has been secured on North Peach St. Medford, and all concerned in any way with the movement are working tirelessly and with much enthusiasm.
