He was backing the movement to make a wool center out of Portland. He bought \$1,500,000 of wool at 40 cents and shipped it to Portland, and went on over \$2,000,000 of other sheepmen's paper. He also put something like \$1,750,000 into feeding. A few days before the primaries which nominated him for the senate, the wool and sheep market went to hell, and Stanfield was not only wiped out, but found himself owing \$1,000,000 or \$2,000,000.
