

Work Started On New Seaside Pier

SEASIDE, April 20.—Actual construction of Seaside's new fishing pier, to be erected a half mile south of the terminus of the promenade on the rocky shoreline of Tillamook Head will begin this week, according to L. C. Rogers, city engineer. The plans call for a structure with suspension features, piling to be driven on the shoreline and a platform to extend out over the water beyond the low tide mark. Approximately \$700 was realized from the benefit dance of last week, which with donations, including a gift of \$100 from Will Pryor, Portland foundryman, insure sufficient funds for the first unit of the proposed pier. Another benefit dance is planned.

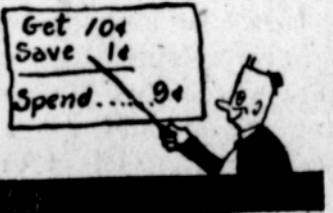
