LUMBER ACTIVITY DECLARED NORMAL

PORTLAND, Ore., April 20— (Special)—A majority of logging camps and sawmills in the fir districts of the Pacific Slope are now operating at close to average schedules as compared with the past three years, according to the 4L employment letter issued here today. The letter stated that although fallers and bucklers have been laid off at a number of fir camps, actual logging is continuing at practically all major operations.

Summer woods work in the pine districts east of the Cascades is gradually being increased. The total number of men employed at pine sawmills this spring is less than that of a year ago; several extra shifts which were in operation last year are not now active.

All kinds of building and construction work, both east and west of the Cascades, is very active and compares favorably with last year at this time. Spring work in agricultural lines is advanced from two to four weeks ahead of normal.

There is at present not much enforced idleness in any district of the Pacific Northwest, the 4L letter indicated.

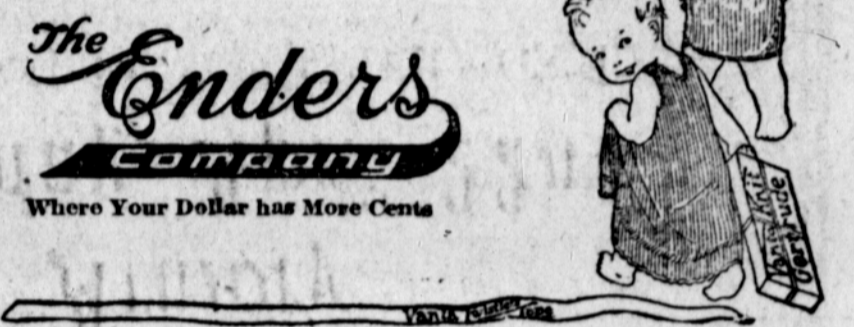
