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MILL WORKER NEAR KLAMATH DIES AT WORK

Mystery Surrounds Sudden Passing of Lennart Sands, Wednesday

INQUEST TO BE HELD

Offer at Lamm's Mill Collapses Alone While in Good Health
Klamath Falls, Ore., April 22.—Mystery surrounds the sudden death yesterday morning at 7:45 o'clock of Lennart C. Sands, 23, offer for Lamm's mill whose body was found lying under a transmission gear, 15 minutes after he had gone to work in apparently good health.
The body was found lying face upwards, a few minutes after death, by a clean-up boy of the mill. All efforts at resuscitation, including hypodermics and the use of a pulmotor, failed. A physician rushed to Modoc Point and took charge of resuscitation.
Death is Mystery
Cause of death is a mystery. Examination of the body disclosed no sign of cuts and bruises or burns from shock. At 7:30 o'clock on his way to work, Sands had met a fellow workman and had passed the time of day.
A post mortem examination will be conducted this evening at Whitlock's funeral home to determine if possible, the cause of death.
The mill worker is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. G. Sands, Roseburg, seven brothers, Frank, Fred, Ralph, Edwin, Charles W., Alfred and Ivor Sands, and two sisters, Mrs. Bertha Henderson and Mrs. Marie Tipton.

Pearl Roberts and Joseph Beach, 15-year-old youths who were arrested south of the city Tuesday evening, were taken to Jacksonville last night where they were turned over to department of justice agents for violation of the Dyer auto theft act. Both boys willingly admitted their guilt to Chief of Police McNabb and Policeman Ingling.
Everett Rhodes and George Thornton, Los Angeles boys, who were riding with the other two, will not face any charges but are being detained here as witnesses. These boys did not know the other two had stolen the car at Long Beach and were not implicated in the theft.
Young Rhodes, who received a flesh wound in the left leg when a revolver bullet pierced the rear of the roadster, was resting easily at a local hospital today. He will be in the hospital for several days. Police got a job for the Thornton boy and he is now working in a local plant.

RATIFICATION OF DEBTS IS ASSURED

SENATORS ARE TOLD TO HALT SHIP WRANGLE

Sale of Admiral Line to Dollar Interests Causing Big Stir

TELEGRAMS RECEIVED

Shipping Board Expected to Take up Matter With Commerce Body
WASHINGTON, D. C., April 22.—(LP)—Hundreds of telegrams urging senators to reconsider their resolution adopted Monday condemning the proposed sale of the government owned Admiral-Oriental line to the Dollar interests are pouring into Washington.
Meanwhile, the United States shipping board, which accepted the Stanley Dollar bid of \$4,500,000 is preparing to take the matter up with the senate commerce committee if the resolution is reconsidered and referred to that committee as is now expected.
Senator Dill of Washington, who charged that this sale would create a monopoly, said he had received a telegram from the Seattle chamber of commerce urging him to withdraw his opposition.

HEARING IS SET

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 22.—(LP)—The senate commerce committee today granted the request of the shipping board for a hearing on the sale of the Admiral-Oriental steamship line. The date of the hearing was set for May 5th.

BRITISH OPERATORS TO PREVENT STRIKE

Coal Miners Agree to Resume Negotiations Before Walking Out
LONDON, April 22.—The coal miners and operators, who are deadlocked over future wage agreements when the coal subsidy of the government expires on May 1, have agreed to resume negotiations, it was announced today.
Premier Baldwin is understood to have been influential in bringing the disputing parties together again, in an effort to forestall the strike which threatens.

Motorist Must Observe Sirens Or Be Arrested

Chief Police McNabb and Fire Chief Baughman today issued a warning to motorists that unless they observe the police auto and fire truck sirens hereafter they will be arrested and taken to court. A state law provides that all other vehicles must give right of way to police and fire vehicles, but lately but little heed is paid to these warning sirens, declared the officials.

Warren Funeral Planned Friday

Funeral services for Chief Warren will be held tomorrow morning at eleven o'clock. Interment will be in the Mountain View cemetery. Mr. Warren killed himself Monday night while temporarily insane.

STUDY OF DRY LAW SOUGHT BY WOMEN

National League of Women Voters Want Public to be Informed
ST. LOUIS, Mo., April 22.—(U.P.)—Women throughout the nation will study the workings of the prohibition law if delegates to the seventh annual convention of the National League of Women Voters here have their way.
Dispersing to their respective homes as the convention came to a close today, a majority of the presidents of state leagues announced their intention of recommending the study of prohibition and possible prohibition legislation to their respective leagues. This determination came largely as a result of yesterday's clash on the convention floor when delegates urged that a resolution expressing opposition to any change in the 18th amendment be put over for study.

NORWEGIAN QUEEN IN AUTO SMASHUP

Both She and Sister Escape Injury in Motor Accident in London
LONDON, April 22.—Queen Maud of Norway and Princess Victoria, the princess royal, both sisters of King George, were in an automobile accident today from which both escaped without injury.
Their motor collided with a taxicab in Knightsbridge, near the American embassy. Both cars were slightly damaged.

DEAD BODIES ARE REMOVED FROM TUNNEL

Only One Survivor of Cave-in Disaster at Quincy, Cal., Saturday

SUSPENSE IS LIFTED

Workers Unable to Reach Entombed Men in Time to Save Them
QUINCY, Cal., April 22.—(U.P.)—Suspense surrounding the tunnel cave-in on the Bucks Mountain ranch was lifted today when the two remaining bodies were pulled from the muddy tomb. They were F. Michelson and J. Erickson. The bodies of William Ope, shift boss, and James McBride had been recovered last night.
Thomas McDermott, who was taken alive from beneath the mass of rock and debris, was the only survivor of the tragedy which occurred last Saturday night.
Michelson had been engaged in tunnel work for years and came here recently from the Natroq cut-off on the Klamath-Eugene line of the Southern Pacific. Erickson also came with Michelson from the Oregon project.

EX-GRIDIRON STAR CONFESSES ROBBERY

Former High School Football Player Also Suspected Murderer
HAMMOND, Ind., April 22.—Daniel Healy, former high school football star, was hurried across the Illinois-Indiana line by postoffice inspectors this afternoon while the sheriff of Cook county was preparing to hold him on a murder charge and pleaded guilty before a United States commissioner to the \$37,000 Indiana Harbor mail robbery. He was held under \$50,000 bond.
Healy, arrested in Chicago last night, is charged by Chicago officers with killing Deputy Sheriff Walter Fisher of Mokena, Ill., a few hours after the mail robbery.

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Stanfield Takes Oregon Officials To See Coolidge

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 22.—(LP)—Senator Robert N. Stanfield of Oregon today escorted 19 Oregon and Washington officials, mainly county judges, to the white house, where they urged the approval of President Coolidge for Senator Stanfield's bill reimbursing the counties of the two states for the loss in taxes by the passage of the timber conservation bill.
The bill provides that counties of the two states shall be reimbursed in the sum of \$5,000,000 for losses sustained when lands under the old Oregon and California railroad land grant reverted to the government under the general conservation and reforestation act.

INSPECTOR OF MILK WILL BE URGED LOCALLY

Health Conference at Medford Maps Out Educational Campaign

ORDINANCE PLANNED

State Dairy Inspector to Aid Ashland, Medford and Grants Pass
A campaign of education among the families of Ashland, Medford and Grants Pass will be started by city and county health authorities in an effort to provide a regular milk dairy inspector for these cities.
This was the decision of a conference at Medford last night, at which J. H. Fuller represented Ashland under appointment by Mayor Johnson.
County Health Officer Geary will conduct the campaign in Jackson county with the cooperation of State Dairy and Food Inspector J. D. Mickle and Miss Nevan Betz, representing the American Child Health association.
Figures produced at the conference showed the cost of maintaining a regular inspector for the three cities would amount to \$3100 for the first year, but would be approximately \$2700 for succeeding years. It was proposed to impose a license tax on all dairies and distributors of milk and to prohibit the selling of milk within the corporate city limits unless such milk was under official inspection and supervision.
Ordinance Drawn
Copies of an ordinance proposed for the three cities were distributed at the meeting. This ordinance was drawn by Mr. Mickle and is fashioned after similar ordinances now in effect in many cities of the state and Pacific coast.
Another meeting will be held on May 20, at which time it is hoped public sentiment will be sufficiently strong to cause the health officials to take active steps toward procuring a milk inspector.

OLD MISSION WILL BE REBUILT SOON

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 22.—(U.P.)—After eight months of scientific research and tests by a board of architects and engineers, a report has been rendered pronouncing the historic Santa Barbara Mission "restorable."
The picturesque landmark, partially destroyed by earthquake last June, will be completely restored on the strength of the experts' findings, it was announced by Ross Montgomery, local architect and spokesman for the permanent architectural board for the restoration of the mission.
The building will be rebuilt in keeping with its "ancient lines and charm," the board reported.
