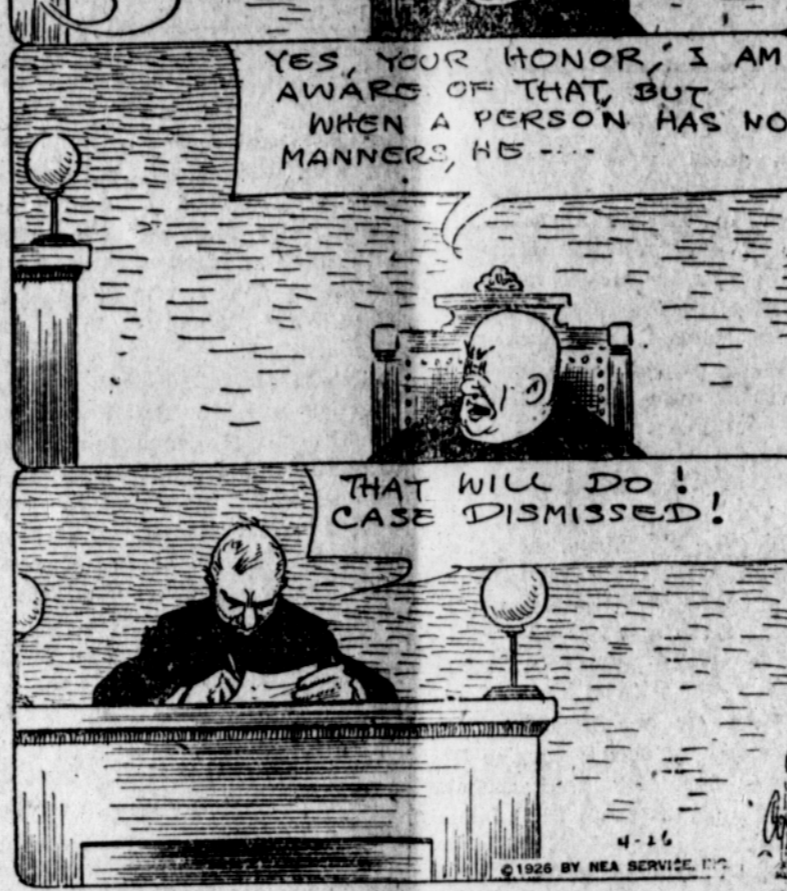
W. C. T. U. to Meet—

FRANCE AND SPAIN STILL SEEK PEACE

New Terms Will Be Submitted to Riffian Leaders To Halt Warfare

PARIS, April 26.—(UP)—Peace between the Riffians and France and Spain emerged from the realm of improbabilities today. It was announced at Quai D'Orsay that France and Spain have waived the Riffian acceptance of preliminary terms which were first presented and that efforts will be made to obtain peace on new terms.
