LETTING NATURE ALONE

Glenn Frank, president of the University of Wisconsin and philosphizer on things in general, confesses he has never taken much interest in "movements," but has now been completely captured by one.

"For the first time in my life," he says, "I came into contact with an organization called Friends of the Native Landscape, a body of men and women of a middle-western state who are determined to see to it, if they can, that the natural beauty of their countryside is preserved against the alleged 'improvements' of civilization."

It is a worthy purpose, whose value is likely to grow on people who think it over. Our civilization, while efficient and comfortable, is rather devastating artistically. Often it abolishes more beauty than it brings.

The spread of our cities is especially lamentable in its effects on the natural charms of the landscape. Allotment developers, and often householders too, seem to think it is necessary to cut down every picturesque knoll and fill up every pleasant valley or ravine, and turn every brook into an underground sewer, and cut down forest trees and plant nursery trees in their place, and substitute hothouse shrubs for natural growths.

Fortunately there are signs of a revolt against this super-civilization and artificial standardization of the outdoors. In many suburban communities there is a new tendency to assume that Nature herself knows a few things about landscape gardening.

TOOTHACHE AND HEX. RES.

The court martial at San Diego, Calif. trying Col. Williams for intoxication on the accusation of Gen. Butler, has brought out some testimony of unusual interest.

Two dental experts, testifying for the defense, explained that when the puritanic general thought he saw his host staggering and babbling in a maudlin manner, the general himself may have been suffering from "dental lesions" which impaired his vision. Toothache, it appears, may cause hallucinations.

FOREIGN MARKETS FOR LUMBER

It is realized in many foreign countries that the United States is the principal source of quality lumber, and we have the great advantage of a large variety of species, each having its distinct uses. Car lumbermen should build up a foreign trade in small dimension stock covering such products as furniture, mill work, novelties, woodenware and many other items, says Alex H. Oxholm, director of the National Committee on Wood Utilization, of the Department of Commerce.

We are already shipping considerable quantities of small dimension stock to buyers in foreign markets, and the great importance of enlarging such foreign outlet in the interest of close wood utilization in this country becomes even more apparent when it is considered that many American sawmills can secure cheaper freight rates to foreign countries than to the principal consuming districts in this country.

STEWART'S WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON, It isn't much more yet than a faint rambling of distant thunder, but it hints at a storm coming, and my guess is that it's headed for the office of Indian affairs in the Interior Department.

Proceeding with our meteorological metaphor, the lightning flashes are away over on the other side of the horizon and it's impossible to tell much about 'em from here, but they're significantly numerous.

According to Mead Steel, a Sioux from the Fort Peck (Mont.) reservation, who's here trying to do something about the trouble isn't so much with the office's personnel as with the system.

He complains that it has too much arbitrary power, which frequently, he says, is exercised oppressively and unjustly.

Steel, he it understood, is the Fort Peck Sioux's unofficial representative in Washington. Such of the various tribes' official delegates as come here from time to time, almost invariably declare that everything's lovely.

"Sure they do," agrees Steel. "The regular way for a tribal council to be held, to choose a delegate to Washington, is for the reservation superintendent to call and control it and see that it makes a selection that suits the Indian office."

"But if the tribe holds its own council, independently of the superintendent, and picks out a real kicker—why, the Indian office says that wasn't a tribal council at all, and refuses to recognize its delegate."

"He may be able to get Congress to listen to him but he has no standing with the Indian bureau."
