 The public should attend to providing for their children's regular long hours of sleep, with windows open, regular, vigorous play, plenty of fresh air, and nutritious clean food, and a regular cleaning bath."
 The daily health activities of the young child are important not only for their immediate effect upon the child's health, but because they form the basis for the health habits of the later life.
 Most persons are, unfortunately, familiar with the child who fusses about his food, who refused what is set before him, who is encouraged to "pick and choose" what he will eat, who eats sweets and pastries rather than simple, nutritious foods, or who eats irregularly at any hour of day or night.
 Of course the youngster's food ought to contain a certain variety during the week, but this does not mean that he should have all the dishes the grown-ups eat. Don't give him tastes from the family table. It will only serve to spoil his taste for his food. Don't let meal-time be turned into play-time, either for the infant or the school child. It is not a good thing to tease the baby while he is eating, or try to amuse him, or to make him the center of a ring of admiring relatives. It has been advised in many cases that the child should be put to bed and kept quiet until rested. Then he is fed simply, regularly and firmly, with wholesome nutritious food, and given no opportunity to indulge in whims and fancies until his food habits are reconstructed—Oregon Parent-Teacher.

SUMMER SCHOOL TO HAVE MANY COURSES
 UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, EUGENE, April 29.—(Special) Twenty courses in education will be given this year at the two sessions of summer school. The instructors for the campus session will be Dean H. D. Sheldon, Prof. B. W. DeBuck and Prof. F. L. Stetson, director of summer school. They will be assisted by Dr. Harry J. Baker, of the Detroit public schools, and Dean Marion Brown, of University high school, Oakland, California.
 Several new courses of special interest to teachers and administrators are announced for this summer, including a course on diagnostic testing and remedial teaching given by Dr. DeBuck, and psychological education of a typical children, by Dr. Baker. There will be a course for deans and advisors of girls, and problems in social and moral guidance for high school students, offered by Miss Brown.
 In addition will be the courses similar to those given in regular university sessions. Four graduate courses are announced and during the past session, Mr. Harold Benjamin will offer work in the session at Portland. Mr. Benjamin is research scholar at Stanford University. His course will be called education liberals.
 Dr. Harry J. Baker, clinical psychologist in Detroit, has had extended experience in this field through his dealings with 200,000 children in Detroit.
