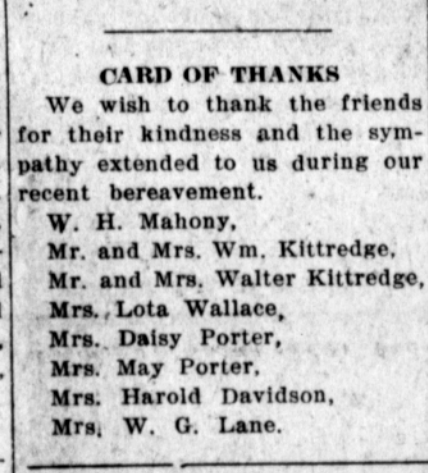

War on Imported Goods Opens in Massachusetts

BOSTON, April 27.—(UP)—Massachusetts women have launched a "Made-in-America" campaign, which will be nationwide in scope, to encourage home industries. Led by Mrs. Charles Sumner Bird and Mrs. Frederick P. Bagley, both prominent in state politics, Bay State women have declared war on imported articles and plan to carry their fight into homes throughout the country in an effort to bring domestic-made goods to the forefront.

"Never, even in the early years of our national life, has the need for protecting our own industries been so great as it is today," said Mrs. Bagley. "The situation is this: Following the war the countries of Europe were depleted and stricken with unemployment. Our own country, with unparalleled generosity made enormous loans. The figure today stands at 22 billions of dollars. A large part of these so-called war loans were made after the war and between three and four billions of our dollars have gone directly or indirectly into foreign industries. In short, we Americans are helping Europe to compete against ourselves. Every nation of Europe is speeding up its industry and at the same time, demanding that its people patronize home industries. In many countries, it is considered a disgrace to buy things made abroad. 'Here in this country, things are different. Imported articles have a glamor for our people and particularly for our women. This is imported,' says the salesman, sure of making his wares more attractive. 'If we allow foreign industries to capture our American market, our national prosperity will fade, our own mills and factories will be idle, and hundreds of thousands will be walking the streets without work. Men are the earners, but women are the spenders. Upon women, mainly, rests the choice of what is bought for family use. Every woman, rich or poor, can help carry on the 'Made in the U. S. A.' movement merely by demanding American-made goods.' Taxes can be paid at City Hall upstairs, beginning Thursday, April 22nd, until May 5. Be sure and bring last year's tax receipt. O.
