\$25,000 PRIZE FOR HELICOPTER EXPIRES

LONDON, (UP)—The \$25,000 cash prize which the British Government offered in 1923 for any one who would construct a practicable helicopter expires at midnight tonight. Thus will be withdrawn from competition the greatest cash "plum" that has ever been offered in the history of aviation.

Although scores of drawings were submitted to the Air Ministry during the three years in which the prize stood open for winning, and although some fifteen inventors registered their names as contestants for the prize only one full-sized machine was ever constructed. And even this one machine was not eligible for the contests in as much as it was built with money furnished by the Air Ministry.

It was the failure of this machine—the Brennan Helicopter—after some \$200,000 has been spent on its construction that was the deciding factor in the decision of the Air Ministry to withdraw the prize altogether from competition and not to renew it for another year as was done in 1925 when the situation as to entries was identical with what it was today.

"We don't say that it is impossible to construct a practicable helicopter," said an official of the Air Ministry today in an exclusive statement to the United Press, "but we do say that the day of the helicopter is not yet in sight."

"Compared with the present performance requirements of airplanes in their field, the requirements for winning the helicopter competition were comparatively simple. To win the \$250,000 prize the machine need have only been able to ascend 1,000 feet vertically and descend vertically the same distance.

"It was required that it should be able to hover over one spot for a given length of time in still air, and to be able to fly a closed circuit of half a mile or so in diameter.

"Yet of all the plans submitted not one inventor came forward with a machine of his own building. The Brennan machine seemed to the Air Ministry the most promising of any of the designs and apart from the prize offering the Ministry sank some \$200,000 in the development of the machine. No pains or expense were spared in its construction and design; yet it turned on its side and crashed after getting a few feet off the ground. With the power we now have available in light-weight aviation motors it seems to be possible to design a machine that can lift itself from the ground by rotating vanes but the problem of lateral stability in helicopters seems as far as ever from being solved.

"The British Air Ministry has abandoned for the time being, and possibly for a long time to come, any hope of solving the problem of vertical ascent and descent by helicopter machines and is devoting itself to the construction of the auto-giro or 'wind-mill' type of airplane.

She Races 'Em



Mrs. Joan LaCosta, world champion girl race driver, who has been smashing records on the tracks in Florida. She has a specially constructed machine. She's bobbed-haired, brown-eyed and possesses the steel-like nerves of a veteran of the opposite sex.

"While these can neither ascend vertically nor hover over one spot they can descend practically vertically and can fly very slowly, and by such performance approach the military requirements of a helicopter more closely than any other type of airplane. We are now building four of these, one of 30-35 horse power, one of 110 horse-power and two of 200 horse-power. These will be ready for testing some time this spring and the Air Ministry is looking forward to these tests with the keenest interest."
