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CHAMBER WILL SPEND BIG SUM FOR PUBLICITY

Advertising Ashland Will be One of Major Projects for Current Year

APPROPRIATION MADE

Budget Committee Increases Sum for Work: Land Settlement Assisted

Advertising Ashland will be a major project of the Ashland chamber of commerce for the ensuing year, and the advertising and publicity committee will immediately hold a meeting with Secretary Fuller to map out plans for such a program. This was the decision of the board of directors at an extended meeting last night.

The report of the budget committee was presented to the board, and aside from the regular necessary operating expenses of the chamber, the largest item was for advertising and publicity. It was felt that Ashland now has greater reason than heretofore for undertaking an energetic and extensive advertising plan. While this has been contemplated for several years the necessary funds have been lacking.

In order to take care of this important feature of the chamber work, the budget committee has reduced some of the other appropriations and a concentrated effort will be directed to the work.

Much to Advertise

Ashland, it was agreed, has the finest park, the best equipped hotels, auto camps, mineral baths, exceptional school privileges and opportunities for industrial and business growth. With this as a basis it was thought a careful advertising plan would be of great value to the city.

The board voted to cooperate with the Jackson county land settlement committee in any plan to send a Jackson county representative to Southern California. Arthur Foster of the state land settlement bureau reported on his recent trip to Southern California and said Jackson county and all of Oregon has an excellent opportunity of interesting many of the Owens valley farmers in coming to Oregon.

NEW SLANT ON GANG ACTIVITIES RELATED

Coroner's Inquest in Chicago Killings Reveals Gang-land Crime Plans

CHICAGO, May 4.—New light was thrown on the machine gun murders of William H. McSwiggan, assistant state's attorney, and two gangster companions, by testimony presented at the coroner's inquest Tuesday.

Witnesses reconstructed the entire scene of the slayings in accounts which differed materially from those originally accepted by authorities.

One of the important new points disclosed by the inquest was that McSwiggan and his friends were killed in daylight. This leads directly to the conclusion that the murderers knew whom they were killing.

Lower Stage Rate To Klamath Falls Is Effective Now

The stage fare between Ashland and Klamath Falls has been reduced from \$4.75 to \$3.20, according to word received here today from Salem. Howard and Grimes, stage operators, have been ordered by the public service commission to make the lower rate effective immediately. The commission made an investigation of stage rates and found the fare between Ashland and Klamath Falls to be excessive.

Local Dairymen For Inspection Of Milk Supply

Ashland dairymen, at a meeting yesterday, went on record as favoring the employment of a regular inspector to grade and inspect all milk sold in this vicinity, but they thought this expense should be borne by the state.

Fourteen of the local dairymen met at the home of L. D. Payne where they elected Mr. Payne as chairman and perfected a temporary organization. A permanent association is planned and the remaining dairymen will be urged to join.

Another meeting will be held at which time a committee will be appointed to examine the proposed dairy inspection ordinance.

LITHIANS INVITED TO BIG GATHERING

Local Booster Club is Asked to Attend Rail Celebration in Eugene

The Lithians today were extended a formal invitation to take part in the big celebration at Eugene in August, celebrating the completion of the Natron-cut-off by E. E. Chadwick, secretary of the Eugene chamber of commerce, who is making a tour of the state in the interests of the big celebration.

Cities from every part of Oregon will be represented at Eugene for this celebration, he said, and the communities of Southern Oregon are urged to participate. Mr. Chadwick was accompanied here by R. H. Kipp, manager of the marketing department of the state chamber of commerce, who is on one of his regular visits about the state.

TRADE UNION NOT TO HALT STRIKE PLANS

Premier Baldwin Told By Labor Spokesman Government Must Fix Terms

LOCK-OUT CONTINUES

Strikers Remain Firm in Original Demands; Labor Leader Thrown in Jail

LONDON, May 6.—(UP)—Labor replied with an unqualified "No" to Premier Baldwin's demand that the strike be called off as the price of the government's resumption of negotiations for peace.

The trades union spokesman said that labor is still seeking an honorable settlement with a withdrawal lock-out notices, but he added that it is up to the government to bring about a situation which will permit peace negotiations.

OTHER STRIKES PLANNED

SYDNEY, Australia, May 6.—(UP)—Following the lead of the English coal miners, the mine engineers of New South Wales have given notice of their intention to strike next Saturday. It will throw 50,000 men out of employment.

AIRPLANE ALASKAN IS BADLY WRECKED

Last Hope of Wilkins Expedition Shattered by Accident This Morning

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, May 6.—(UP)—The airplane Alaskan, the last hope of the Wilkins polar expedition, was wrecked today, perhaps beyond repair, on an attempted take-off for Point Barrow, from which the outpost flight over the north pole was to be attempted.

The riple motor plane, Detroit, the second craft of the expedition, was pronounced too heavy for use last week. When Captain Wilkins and Pilot Eielson start off for Point Barrow today the plane rose a few feet and then lowered to the ground where it struck a hole in the field, crushing the right wing.

\$1,000,000 Liquor Theft Discovered

SAN FRANCISCO, May 6.—(UP)—An inventory of liquor stocks in a government warehouse here has disclosed disappearance of \$1,000,000 worth of seized whiskey. The inventory was filed Tuesday by Col. Ned M. Green, prohibition administrator. More than half the seized liquors were listed as "stolen by unknown parties," "water substituted for whiskey," or "missing by robbery."

RUSSIANS ARE ASKED TO ASSIST BRITISH

Trade Unions Urged to Give Part of Day's Pay to Support Strikers

MOSCOW, May 6.—(UP)—Russian trade union council has appealed to all trade unionists to contribute a quarter of one day's pay to support the British strikers. A sum estimated at \$1,800,000 could be raised in this manner. Approximately \$130,000 has already been telegraphed to the British trade union council.

Turkey May Soon Have Prohibition

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 6.—The Turkish government has prohibited the drinking of champagne, whiskey and imported wines in Angora. The move is seen as the first step toward national prohibition.

82-YEAR-OLD KLAMATH MAN SENDS MESSAGE TO MOTHER WHO IS NOW 105 YEARS OLD

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 6.—At least one mother who has passed the century mark in life will be the recipient of bright flowers on Mother's Day, May ninth. She is Mrs. Martha Voltaire of Washington, D. C. Today her son S. H. "Dad" Voltaire of the Winters apartments, is celebrating his eighty-second birthday and telling his friends who marvel at his activity, that his mother is now active at the age of 105. Born in France in the year 1821 Mrs. Voltaire remained in Europe until she reached the age of 18 when she came to United States, where she has lived for more than 87 years. In speaking of Mother's Day today, "Dad" who is a familiar figure on the streets of Klamath Falls stated that not once since the inauguration of the day in 1909 had he failed to send his mother flowers each year. Besides his mother in the east "Dad" has two sisters living in Washington, D. C., one who recently observed her seventy-fourth birthday and the other who has passed the seventy-sixth year. "Keep active and interested in the affairs of everyone" is my motto, "Dad" replied in answer to a question as to how he kept young.

GUARD RAIL TO BE ERECTED ON STATE HIGHWAY

Safeguards Will be Maintained on Ashland-Klamath Road This Summer

PROTECTS MOTORISTS

Division Engineer Gets Authority to Proceed With Needed Work

Construction of 2000 feet of guard railing on the Ashland-Klamath highway between Keno and the Jackson-Klamath county line has been authorized by the state highway commission at Salem, according to word received here today. C. C. Seeley, resident highway engineer, has been authorized to proceed with the work at once.

Lumber for the guard rails has been purchased and will be seasoned for two months before it is placed. Mr. Seeley expects to put up the railing early in July.

The guard rail fences will be constructed on bad turns and other dangerous spots on the highway.

The fences, painted a glaring white, will considerably lessen the accident hazard on the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway. To a motorist unfamiliar with the road, hair pin and right angle turns are a constant danger.

NEW OUTBREAK FROM MAUNA LOA FEARED

Underground Stream of Lava is Heard Near Crater, is Report

HONOLULU, th., May 6.—A rushing underground stream of lava, discharging heavy gases through crevices overhead, was heard by a party of campers near the source of the Hoopuloa flow from the volcano Mauna Loa they reported today.

This, together with thin spirals of smoke constantly seen rising from Mauna Loa's craters indicated that the mountain is still experiencing some activity.

Two of the seven cones that took part in the recent activity are believed to have become dormant.

DEPUTY WARDEN IN ILLINOIS MURDERED

Seven Convicts Overpower Peter Klein and Stab Him Through Heart

JOLIET, Ill., May 6.—(UP)—Deputy Warden Peter N. Klein was killed in an attempted break at the Illinois state penitentiary here yesterday when seven convicts, five of whom were serving time for murder, trapped him in a solitary cell house and stabbed him through the heart.

Union Miners Are Fined For Attack

BOONEVILLE, Ind., May 6.—(UP)—Thirty-three union miners were fined \$25 and costs in circuit court today by Circuit Judge Lindsey for their part in attacks on non-union miners at the John Bull and Possum Ridge mines two months ago.

British Strike Cuts Off Supply Of London Beer

LONDON, May 6.—(UP)—The first 24 hours of the strike brought about a beer shortage. The famous Cheshire Cheese Chop House, known to all American tourists, closed Tuesday night because it ran out of beer, an experience which has not occurred before within the memory of its 100-year history. Other "pubs" are closing because the strike cut off delivery of their supplies.
