AN OLD PLAN IN NEW GUISE

Influential foreign financiers ,backed by a few in this country, are advocating a plan for liquidating German reparations under the Dawes plan and wiping out all international indebtedness.

Germany owes to the various governments which have been awarded reparations a sum equivalent to \$3.750,-000,000. To secure the payment of this indebtedness Germany has pledged all its state-owned railways, which are otherwise free from debt, and deposited mortgages on a certain number of German industrial plants. It is suggested that this indebtedness be funded in negotiable bonds which should be disposed of to private investors throughout the world. This would enable Germany to pay off in cash its reparation debt.

The nations receiving this money owe the United States \$11,000.000,000. The U.S. Treasury officials frankly admit that this sum will not be collected and the proponents of the refunding plan believe the present value of all these debts will fall within the \$5,750,000,000. In other words it is proposed to cancel all the debts due Uncle Sam for what Germany will pay and make Germany and the United States pay this entire war debt.

In view of the fact that nearly all nations have acknowledged their debts and agreed to pay in the course of time, it is not probable that any American will have the temerity to seriously advocate such a propositon. Yet almost anything may happen.

CONTROL OF THE AIR

The question of controlling wave-lengths in the air promises to be a difficult problem for Congress to solve. started out to be as big as a tree. Until a Federal Court ruled that he had no authority Secretary Hoover regulated the question, but as the matter now stands there is no control — no system, and con-

President Coolidge favors control by an executive department. Others contend that it should be regulated [by a commission in much the same way as the railroads, and express the fear that if handled by a Cabinet officer political abuses might develop.

ment now, and the manner in which they have handled affairs does not guarantee satisfaction to political opponents. From this viewpoiint there is but little choice and the whole question may have to be revised as a result of future development and experience.

CONQUEST OF MORROCO

For more than a week the Riffs, French and Spaniards have been negotiating terms of peace, but the chances are that they will not reach an agreement. The Riffs demand the right to rule their own country. The chief demands of the allies are that the Riffs pledge allegiance to the Sultan of Morocco and that Abdel-Krim submit to voluntary exile. Autonomy has been promised the Riff when peace is restored. The French and Spaniards have threatned to renew hospitalities. 'Upon just what he will say will determine whether the Riffian war, is to end or continue.

A few years ago the late vice-president Tom Marshall declared that what America needed was a good five-cent cigar. He may have been joking, but the fact is that with the aid of machinery the good five-cent cigar is back to stay. About 40 per cent of the 6-600,000,000 eigars produced last year were sold for five cents each.

Farm relief legislation seems to have a bearing in two directions one for the relief of the farmer and the other for the relief of the congressman. Farmers have been told to work out their own salvation, find out and agree on what they want - and a very large percentage of them have been working overtime on that job. Hence the discomfort in Washington.

An Italian inventor is said to have designed an airplane which, using exhaust gas exploded violently against the fame of a turbine will move independently of a propellor and will be able "if timed accurately enough" to travel to the moon. The inventor does not tell us how the traveler will return from the moon.
