SALEM, Ore., May 12.—Falling 130 feet from a spar tree, J. A. Johnson, a high climber employed by a logging camp at Silverton, near here, was almost instantly killed yesterday. It was thought his hook failed to catch in a chain and his safety belt broke. The dead man was a resident of Portland.

Hartley to report to the next state legislature. The tentative plans call for a 30-mile bore, costing about \$4,000,000.
