To Inspect the Recreational Areas—

To inspect the recreational areas at Union Creek, Rocky Point, Diamond Lake and Lake of the Woods and the Bear creek timber sale area in the Crater National forest, C. J. STANFIELD BILL IS REPORTED FAVORABLY

Both Senate and House Committees Favor Land Grant Reimbursement

According to private advice received here today, the Stanfield bill providing for the reimbursement of a number of Oregon counties for taxes lost when the old Oregon and California Railroad land grants reverted to the government, is ready to be reported out favorably by both the house and senate public lands committees.

This bill will give Jackson county a considerable sum of money for public use when and if it is finally passed by congress. Delegates from Jackson county as well as other coast counties of Oregon are now in the national capital lobbying for the measure.
