LOCAL WOMEN ARE VICTIMS IN CAR CRASH

Miss Grace Chamberlain and Miss Elizabeth Palmer Badly Injured

RUSHED TO HOSPITAL
Car Turns Over Near Red Bluff; Friends Here Alarmed Over Reports

Miss Grace Chamberlain and Miss Elizabeth Palmer, both of Ashland, and both prominent in club work throughout the state, are lying seriously injured in the Sister's hospital at Red Bluff today as the result of injuries sustained in an auto accident at Las Molinas, 20 miles south of Red Bluff, late yesterday afternoon.

According to reports telephoned from hospital authorities to Mrs. Gordon MacCracken this morning, Miss Palmer is the more seriously injured, although attending physicians said they were hopeful that both would recover.

Hurtles Into Ditch
But meager reports of the accident were received here. It was indicated, however, that the car, an Essex coach, got out of control and hurtled into a ditch. It toppled over and both women were thrown beneath the wreckage.

The injured women were rushed to a hospital at Red Bluff, where it was at first feared Miss Palmer was dying. Reports received by anxious friends of the two prominent Ashland residents this morning were to the effect that Miss Palmer was still in an unconscious condition. Miss Chamberlain had regained consciousness, although she was lapsing into a semi-conscious state at intervals.

Friends Alarmed
Mrs. MacCracken and other close friends of the two women wanted to rush to the bedside of the injured motorists, but Miss Chamberlain sent word by hospital authorities, urging against it. Miss Chamberlain and Miss Palmer left here yesterday morning on a brief vacation trip to California. They had planned on reaching Chico by last night.

Members of the local civic club are keeping in almost constant touch with the hospital at Red Bluff so that they might be advised of any change in the condition of the two injured women.

Obtain No Clues In Attack Probe

Police today had obtained no clues as to the identity of the men who bound and gagged Mrs. Hattie Kozart at her home at Sixth and E streets Monday night, robbing her of \$4.50 in silver and a ring. Mrs. Kozart reported she was seized by the assailant as she responded to a knock at the kitchen door.

After binding Mrs. Kozart the prowler then proceeded to ransack the house. The victim was able to release herself after struggling for nearly two hours.

The fliers reported they secured some good pictures of the Norge remains, and each pilot felt sure he would put his films aboard the mid-week boat from San Francisco.

AUXILIARY TO AID VETERANS IN HOSPITALS

Annual Poppy Sale Will Start in Ashland Tomorrow, is Word

FOR WORTHY PURPOSE
Money to go to Sick and Wounded Soldiers; 1500 is Quota for City

Through weary months of illness and convalescence in the government hospital, No. 77, maimed and wounded veterans of the world war have been fashioning red poppies, symbolic of the poppies of Flanders Field.

In Ashland tomorrow, Friday and Saturday the women of the American Legion auxiliary will sell these poppies to the citizens of Ashland. The Ashland quota has been placed at 1500, and the auxiliary, in order to keep up its record for completing every job it starts, is determined to sell every poppy which has been sent to them.

To Have Booths
Booths will be established on down town street corners and in stores and other places during the three days while members of the auxiliary carry on the poppy sale campaign.

All of the money derived from the sale of these vivid reminders of Flanders Field and the world war will go to the war veterans who are in government hospitals.

The sale was to have been held next week, but was advanced to this week because of the appearance here of the official war picture, "On Flanders Field," which is being shown at the Vining theatre under the auspices of the American Legion post.

AGRICULTURE WILL GET FINANCIAL AID

Government to Spend Big Sum of Money for Farmers During the Year

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 19.—The government will spend nearly \$140,000,000 during the next fiscal year, beginning July 1, in an effort to relieve the present agricultural depression. Secretary Jardine said the livestock industries would receive \$1,100,000 in federal aid for tuberculosis work among cattle, while good roads, a necessity to farmers, will get nearly \$80,000,000.

Senators Listen To Spicy Debates

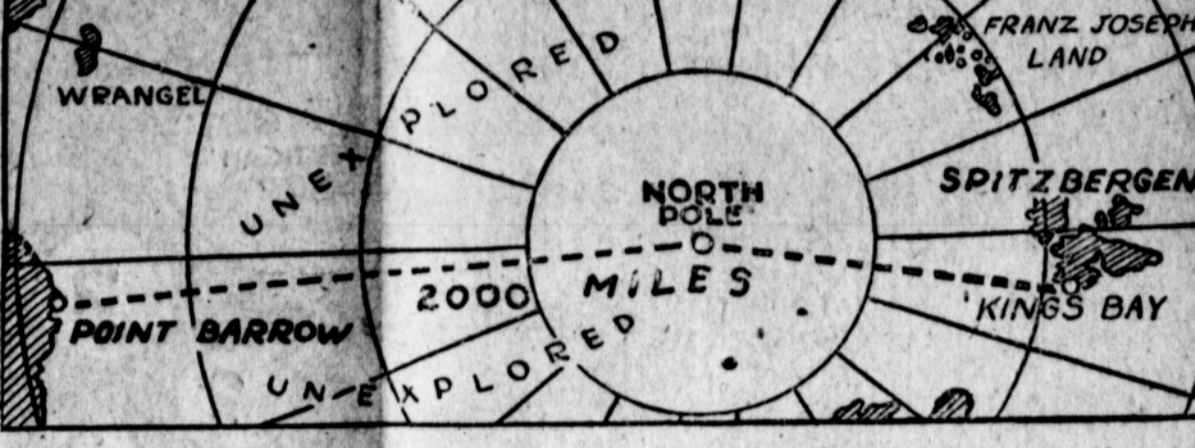

TRENTON, N. J., May 19.—(UP)—The conviction of Harrison W. Noel, of Montclair, N. J., for the murder of Raymond Pierce, a negro taxi driver, was today reversed by the court of errors and appeals here. The court's vote was 12 to 1. He was convicted of the murder as part of a kidnapping. His defense was insanity.

NEWCASTLE, Pa., May 19.—While corking up a bottle to deliver to a customer at his cabin home, Martin Cray shook up the bottle, to demonstrate the "head." The cork flew out, striking his left eye which was later removed. Cray will face charges.

MORE ARRESTS ARE MADE IN RUM PROBE

Two Tugboat Captains Held as Part of Big Coast Liquor Conspiracy

SEATTLE, Wash., May 19.—(UP)—Further ramifications of the activities of the huge international rum running ring which is now being broken up were revealed here today with the arrest of two tugboat captains, Vivian Grubb and Howell Parker. They are charged with violations of the federal prohibition laws and are included in the nearly 200 indicted by the federal grand jury last week.

German War Ship Visits San Pedro

SAN PEDRO, Cal., May 19.—(UP)—The Hamburg, training cruiser of the German navy, dropped anchor in the harbor here today. It was the first time in 14 years that a German dreadnaught has visited the United States. The vessel is en route on a trip around the world.

ILLINOIS TORNADO TAKES HEAVY TOLL

Big Property Damage Caused by Twister; Aviator Dashed to Earth

CHICAGO, Ill., May 19.—(UP)—Waste and wreckage lay today in the path of the tornado which last night swept through Central Illinois and cut a swath through several Chicago suburbs before it vanished. Ross Kirkpatrick, a flier on a Chicago-Detroit airplane, was killed when his machine was caught by the storm and dashed to earth. Many buildings were wrecked.

Pal Of Chapman Goes To Prison

HARTFORD, Conn., May 19.—(UP)—Walter Shean, who was with Gerald Chapman the night James Skelley was killed, and who furnished the state of Connecticut with evidence upon which the super bandit was hanged, escaped the consequences of his criminal partnership with a sentence of from one to five years imprisonment.

Worker Falls In River And Drowns

PORTLAND, Ore., May 19.—(UP)—Thomas A. Anker, 51, was drowned here today when he stumbled and fell into the river at the Peninsula Milldock. A sailor threw him a line but Anker evidently had been hurt in the fall and did not grasp it.

Byrd Will Make South Pole Trip

GREEN HARBOR, Spitzbergen, May 19.—(UP)—Lieutenant Commander R. E. Byrd, who flew from Spitzbergen to the north pole and back by airplane, will attempt a flight to the south pole, he announced here today. He will start from New York by ship late in September, he said.

Inmate Poor Farm Rich; Had \$10,000 in Bank

SEATTLE, May 19.—For four years, Multnomah county, Oregon, fed and clothed Pat Sullivan, aged Irishman. When he died recently the charitable inclined county learned that Sullivan had \$10,600 laid away in a Seattle bank.

This was developed today when Probate Judge Smith was petitioned to name Attorney Wesley J. Meffia administrator of the estate here. Miffin, Multnomah county officials might file a claim against the estate for the board and room bill of its erstwhile ward. Nothing is known of Sullivan's relatives.

NEVADA MURDERERS WILL BE EXECUTED

CARSON CITY, Nev., May 19.—One hope of life remains for Randolph and Stanko Jukich, condemned to die in the lethal gas chamber of Nevada's state penitentiary here.

The board of pardons will sit in a special session Thursday to hear the last pleas of the convicted murderers. If pardons are denied, the men will be executed Friday.

W. E. D. Stokes of Divorce Court Fame, Passes at Home in New York

NEW YORK, May 19.—(UP)—W. E. D. Stokes, wealthy retired capitalist, died here today. He had been ill for several days from double pneumonia. Stokes gained nationwide attention a few years ago through his sensational divorce action involving himself and Helen Elwood Stokes, former Denver beauty.

CALCUTTA, India, May 19.—(UP)—Five were killed and 21 injured in Hindu-Moslem riots at Kharagpur. Police were called during the riot and now have control.

VOTERS WILL NAME CHOICES NEXT FRIDAY

Primary Campaign in Oregon Will Come to End By Tomorrow Night

BIG INTEREST SHOWN
Senatorial Fight Overshadows Others; Local Polling Places Given

Oregon voters will go to the polls Friday to select their party nominees for national, state and county offices. The fight for the republican senatorial nomination overshadows all other contests, with Robert N. Stanfield, Frederick Stelwer and A. E. Clark, the three leading candidates. In the democratic primaries Bert E. Haney and Elton Watkins are staging a real battle with the result still in doubt.

Jay Upton, I. L. Patterson and W. A. Carter are the three candidates for the republican gubernatorial nomination, with the race conceded to be between Upton and Patterson, with Carter getting good support in Portland and Multnomah county. On the democratic side, Governor Walter M. Pierce is opposed by Louis Palmer Webber, who four years ago was one of the chief aides in the Pierce campaign.

With two supreme court judges to nominate, the republicans have three candidates in the field, Thomas A. McBride, chief justice, and Henry J. Bean are seeking re-nomination. George S. Shepherd, a Portland lawyer also is seeking the nomination.

School Job Attracts
A large field of candidates is after the republican nomination for state superintendent of public instruction to succeed J. A. Churchill, who is leaving that office to take over the presidency of the Ashland state normal school the first of June. Charles A. Howard of Marshfield and County School Superintendent Alderson of Portland are conceded to be the two leading candidates, with school officials largely supporting the Marshfield educator.

County Races
In Jackson county interest centers largely around the primary campaign between Ralph Cowgill and George W. Dunn for the republican nomination for state senator. Both candidates have been campaigning actively for the past several weeks and both are predicting victory.

County Commissioner George Alford is opposed by C. E. Terrill, former sheriff, for the republican nomination for county commissioner. William Briggs of Ashland and John H. Carkin of Medford are without opposition for the two nominations for Jackson county representative on the republican ticket.
