COUNTY SENDS AGENTS INTO OWENS VALLEY

Olin Arnsperger and F. M. Carter Leaving for California Tomorrow

COOPERATIVE EFFORT

Chambers of Commerce Unite in Urging Settlers to Come to Jackson

Weighted down with many pounds of pamphlets and literature of every section of Jackson county, Olin Arnsperger, manager of the Talent Irrigation district, and F. M. Carter of Ashland will leave by auto tomorrow for the Owens Valley district of California in a determined effort to interest farmers of that section in the fertile lands of Jackson county and the Rogue river valley.

The two land agents will remain in the Owens Valley country for 10 days or two weeks distributing literature and talking to farmers who might be prospective settlers in this section. They are being sent to California through the cooperative efforts of the Ashland and Medford chambers of commerce.

Seek New Locations
The Owens Valley farmers are being compelled to seek new localities. The city of Los Angeles is buying up their land for the new Los Angeles water system and is paying them cash for their property, which makes them the best class of prospective settlers.

PRESBYTERIANS TO BUILD NEW CHURCH

Astoria Plans Edifice Costing \$68,000 to be Reared This Fall

ASTORIA, May 20. — (LP) — Construction will be started in Astoria next fall on a new \$68,000 First Presbyterian church, the congregation having directed its elders to proceed with the financing and construction of the church. Approximately one-third of the necessary funds have already been subscribed. The church will be of brick in the Gothic style and will occupy a site 100 by 200 feet.

Good scholarship was attained by all the students during the last semester and not one of the students who passed the mid-year examinations failed in the final term of school work.

The graduating exercises are open to the public and it is expected that the armory will be crowded with relatives, and friends of the graduates as well as school patrons generally.
