Cowgill Makes Statement

The Republican County Convention was held in Medford on March 30th. About two weeks prior to this date Mr. Dunn assured me that he wanted the endorsement of the convention. The following letter was delivered to my house on March 29, the day before the convention. I would hesitate to publish this letter if it had not been reported to me from different parts of the county that some of Mr. Dunn's supporters are claiming that he is the champion of the direct primary and are asking support for him in this claim. Mr. Dunn's letter clears the situation.

My Dear Mr. Cowgill:

In order that there may be no misunderstanding between us as candidates for the nomination for state senator, I take this opportunity to explain to you my intentions in the matter. Owing to the fact that in very many of the precincts there were no elections called or held by the precinct committees for the election of delegates to the County Convention to be held on March 30th, and very many Republican voters had no opportunity to express their preference for delegates to the convention, and, for the further reason, that there seemed, so far as I can learn, very little interest taken in the primary election, I have decided not to ask this convention for endorsement of my candidacy for the office of State Senator. I will file in the regular manner provided by law. I realize that in doing this I will be at quite a disadvantage in the coming primaries.

I have watched with interest the reaction of the voters to this pre-primary convention. They have taken little interest in it. In my own precinct, I had no chance to vote because there was no election held or even called; and, that is true in so many precincts, I feel that there was no unbiased expression of the Republican Party and believe that the opposition will use this against us in the fall election. Personally, I favor the idea of party conventions; but believe that they should be legalized and made state wide and that party platforms should be written by a state convention. Otherwise we are liable to have a variety of platforms that may not harmonize.

With kindest personal regards and with the assurance that if you lick me in a fair contest, you will have my support in the November election, I am,

Parent-Teacher Notes

Train For Your Profession
Few parents with a baby have as much knowledge given them about the care of the child as a Ford owner is given in starting out with a new car.
