MILLION BOYS AND GIRLS TO ATTEND SUMMER CAMPS

NEW YORK, May 20.—(UP)—More than 1,000,000 boys and girls are expected to attend 6,000 camps in the United States and Canada during the summer.

Enrollment of this year's camps for a greater season than ever before is now practically complete, according to H. W. Gibson, of Boston, president of the National Camp Directors' Association and head of Y. M. C. A. work among boys for Massachusetts and Rhode Island.
