## PATTERSON IS WINNER; FRED STEIWER, TOO

Jay Upton and Robert N. Stanfield Defeated in Republican Primary

### BALLOTS TABULATED

But Small Chance to Change Result; Bert Haney is Leading Watkins

PORTLAND, Ore., May 22.—(Special)—Frederick W. Steiwer, Pendleton lawyer, is maintaining a safe lead over Robert N. Stanfield for the republican senatorial nomination, and I. L. Patterson, Elso, Polk county farmer, has a commanding lead over Jay Upton, his nearest opponent, for the republican gubernatorial nomination, according to latest figures compiled here at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

In a tabulation of 1053 precincts scattered over the state out of a total of 1847 precincts, Steiwer was leading Stanfield, 25,580 to 16,849. Clark was running a poor third.

Patterson Ahead  
 In the gubernatorial race on the republican ticket, Patterson had 35,843 votes in the same number of precincts. Upton was second with 22,641 votes and Carter third with 12,313 votes.

C. A. Howard, Marshfield educator, was a certainty for the republican nomination for state superintendent of public instruction. He was leading with 23,687, with W. C. Alderson of Portland second with 14,743.

## Klamath Rejects Managerial Plan By Heavy Margin

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 22.—(Special)—By a vote of more than two to one, Klamath Falls voters yesterday went to the polls and rejected the proposed commission-manager form of government. The campaign was one of the most bitter staged here since the days of the old court house fight when the city was torn asunder by rival factions.

The commission-manager plan was approved by the chamber of commerce, lumber operators and merchants generally, but organized labor and the supporters of Mayor Goddard were violently opposed to it.

In the other race which engendered much bitter feeling, Mayor Fred R. Goddard defeated Robert H. Bunnell for the republican nomination for county judge by a plurality of more than two to one.

## MISS CHAMBERLAIN IN BAD CONDITION

Local Woman Has Broken Collarbone and Shoulder, Telegram States

In addition to a fractured skull, Miss Grace Chamberlain of this city also is suffering from a broken collar bone and a broken shoulder blade, according to word received in a telegram from Red Bluff this morning by Mrs. H. C. Gale.

Miss Elizabeth Palmer, who was injured in the same auto accident, suffered no broken bones and is recovering rapidly, the telegram states. She is suffering mainly from a deep scalp wound as well as other cuts and bruises. She will be able to sit up within a few days.

Miss Chamberlain is conscious and is expected to recover, barring unexpected complications.

## BIG LIQUOR RAID STAGED AT TACOMA

Four Men and Large Quantity of Moonshine Seized on Lonely Ranch

SEATTLE, Wash., May 22.—(UP)—Federal agents early today made a surprise raid on the ranch of C. R. Ohls, 35 miles southeast of Tacoma and captured one of the most modern stills ever taken. Four men were arrested and two 500-gallon stills and 7000 gallons of mash were seized. The agents also got 70 sacks of sugar, 350 gallons of kerosene and almost 400 gallons of moonshine. Shortly later they also seized a touring car containing 130 gallons of moonshine. The plant was located on a specially constructed building and had its own water and power plant. Ohls, owner of the ranch, was placed in jail.

Bridegroom 92 Years Old Not to be Allowed to Enjoy Honeymoon

PORTLAND, Ore., May 22.—(UP)—Although old, happy and just married Mr. and Mrs. Collin A. Wallace, 92 and 70 years of age respectively, will not be permitted to enjoy their honeymoon in peace.

Wallace and his bride, who was Mrs. Lourora McVicker were married by Rev. P. O. Bonebrake. Today, when relatives of Wallace learned of the marriage, a threat that annulment steps would be taken was issued.

## MAUD BALDWIN KILLS SELF AT KLAMATH FALLS

Daughter of Pioneer Oregon Family Leaps From Bridge Over Link River

### BODY IS RECOVERED

Leaves Brief Note to Friends Saying She Feared She was Losing Mind

Miss Maud Baldwin, daughter of a prominent pioneer Klamath county family and well known in Ashland, committed suicide at 3 o'clock last night by leaping off the Link river bridge just off the old business district of Klamath Falls. Her body was recovered this morning at the point where Link River flows into Lake Ewauna.

Miss Baldwin, who was 47 years old, had been taking care of her invalid mother for many years, and the strain of this constant attention for the aged parent unbalanced her mind, is the belief of relatives and Klamath authorities.

Leav's Farewell  
 The unfortunate woman left a brief note addressed to Mrs. Katherine Wright, house-keeper at the Baldwin home, in which she stated she feared she was losing her mind and had decided to end her suffering.

So far as is known, nobody saw Miss Baldwin take the fatal leap from the bridge. Her body was floating on the surface of the water when searchers began looking for it at daybreak today.

The deceased woman had many friends in Ashland and throughout Jackson county, all of whom will mourn her tragic passing.

## NEVADA MURDERER CONFESSES GUILT

Sam Brown Admits Slaying for Which Woman Faced Possible Conviction

VIRGINIA CITY, Nev., May 22.—(UP)—The lethal gas chamber in the state prison yard cheated additional victims today when Sam Brown confessed to the murder of Martin Trujillo here Tuesday night and was sentenced to from 10 years to life. Brown's confession was followed by the release of Mrs. Josephine McCormack and two companions who were held accessories in the slaying. Officers said that had not Brown admitted the murder they were going to free him and charge Mrs. Brown with the crime.

## FERTILIZER PLANTS DESTROYED IN FIRE

Loss of Million Dollars Reported in Big Blaze at Baltimore Today

BATIMORE, May 22.—Fire today destroyed two Canton fertilizer plants with a loss totaling \$1,000,000. Originating from an unknown cause in the Griffith & Boyd company's plant, the flames spread to the Summers fertilizer factory occupying the next block and destroying both.

## RALPH COWGILL HAS SLIGHT LEAD OVER GEORGE W. DUNN FOR SENATORIAL NOMINATION

Ralph Cowgill of Medford, early this afternoon was leading his opponent, George W. Dunn, of this city, for the Republican nomination for state senator, with reports missing from several outlying precincts, where the election officers failed to properly report the returns of the primary held yesterday.

While Dunn has been generally conceded the nomination during the morning the lead had been by such a small margin that the contest was proving one of the most exciting races in local political history. At noon the lead was switched to Cowgill by a small margin.

The final report before going to press indicated that Cowgill was leading by the margin of only 12 votes, Cowgill having received 1159 while Dunn was credited with 1147 in 42 precincts.

This was the closest race in the primary, with practically all of the attention locally centering on the candidates for the nomination. Cowgill, it will be remembered, was endorsed by the Republican pro-primary convention held in Medford while Dunn did not appear before the convention and

Local Baseball Team Greatly Improved During the Present Week

### VICTORY PROPHESED

New Infielders Add Strength to Club; More Players Are Enroute

With a rejuvenated team in the field, Ashland hopes, expects and promises to make it a real game against Medford when the two teams line up at the Jackson Hot Springs ground at 2:30 tomorrow afternoon for the opening game of at the local park.

## Bert E. Haney Beats Watkins In Local Vote

Bert E. Haney carried Ashland over Elton Watkins, former congressman, 60 to 26, in the democratic primaries yesterday. In only one precinct did Watkins run ahead of the former shipping board member, that being in the east Central precinct.

As was expected, Governor Pierce ran far ahead of Louise Palmer Weber for the democratic nomination for governor in Ashland. Pierce carried all eight precincts with a total of 82 as against 9 for Mrs. Weber.

Milton A. Miller, old-time democratic war horse, ran ahead of Oswald West, former governor, and Will R. King, present democratic national committee man, for that office. The vote was: Miller, 55; West, 32; King, 7.

J. O. Rigg received 13 democratic votes for state senator, his name having been written in by his friends in six of the precincts.

## UNIFORM PACKING OF LOCAL FRUITS URGED

Former Ashland Resident Commends Association For Taking Action

Uniform packing and marketing of Ashland fruit will result in better markets and better prices, in the belief of David F. Fox, former Ashland resident, who now lives in Portland. This is especially true of the peach crop, he believes.

In a letter to S. D. Taylor, manager of the local fruit association, Mr. Fox gives his ideas of the value of proper packing so far as it relates to the Portland market. His letter follows: "I see by the Tidings that your Association is about to do what should have been done years ago. Namely, that of having all fruit sent out from the Fruit Association packed by expert packers—

which you, I am pleased to know are now having done or will have. I have lived in Portland the last nine years and during that time I have not seen a decent Ashland peach in any of the stores or markets. In asking the Portland merchant why the Ashland peaches were not on sale as were peaches from other locations, the reply would invariably be, 'The Ashland fruit is badly packed and make a bad showing.' Last August, while talking to one merchant about the Ashland peaches he called my attention to a box of Ashland peaches he had just received and opened, saying 'Would you believe any peach grower would be guilty of sending such peaches to market as these? I was certainly surprised and amazed for they were hardly decent culls.

"Until the Ashland peach is properly packed they will remain tabooed in the Portland market and they should be. Fruit of every description from all other points sent here is artistically packed making it look very inviting."

## SENATOR DUNN LEADS TICKET IN THIS CITY

Local Man Given Largest Vote in Race for Senatorial Nomination

### OTHER RESULTS GIVEN

Stanfield and Patterson Are Choice of Ashland Republican Voters

State Senator George W. Dunn led the republican ticket in Ashland in the state primaries yesterday, with William Briggs, unopposed for state representative, second and C. A. Howard, in a field of five for school superintendent, third.

Out of a total vote of 419 in the eight Ashland precincts, Dunn got 338 to 81 for Ralph P. Cowgill, his opponent.

William Briggs got 296 votes in Ashland and John Carter 259 for representative. There were two to nominate and neither had an opposition.

Robert N. Stanfield and I. L. Patterson carried Ashland for United States senator and governor.

Votes for Senator  
 The vote for senator here follows: Stanfield, 140; Steiwer, 110; Clark, 79; Crossley, 49; Sandblast, 27; Shumway, 11; Barrett, 8; Evey, 1.

The vote for governor was: Patterson, 205; Upton, 161; Carter, 59.

For school superintendent the Ashland vote was as follows: Howard, 291; Alderson, 31; Toose, 29; Parrott, 28; Bryant, 25.

For county commissioner Alford beat Terrill in Ashland, 262 to 163. Terrill carried but two of the eight precincts, east Ashland and Southeast Ashland.

Senator Stanfield carried seven of the eight Ashland precincts. In the other, northwest Ashland, Steiwer was leading.

Patterson carried all but the Oak street precinct against Upton and Carter. Upton won out in the Oak street precinct by a substantial plurality.

The total vote cast in Ashland was 425, which was the peak vote in both the gubernatorial and senatorial contests on the republican ticket.
