SHORTER ROAD INTO KLAMATH BEING SOUGHT

Highway Via Eugene and Oak Ridge Proposed to Highway Commission

NO ACTION IS TAKEN State Body Refuses Decision: Much New Bridge and Road Work Planned

PORTLAND, Ore., May 26.—(U.P.)—Lane county delegates to the state highway commission meeting today asked permission to use county bonds in the sum of \$256,000 to start a new highway from Oak Ridge to Lowell, with the understanding that the project would be completed by the forest service.

The delegates from Eugene pointed out that such a road would cut the distance between Portland and Klamath Falls by 56 miles, and would provide a more direct road between the two points. The commission declined to take any definite action on the proposal.

Surfacing of the Roosevelt highway for a distance of 24 miles—construction of two bridges in Lincoln county and one in Tillamook county were ordered. Total of these various projects was placed at \$299,000.

CRAZY LOS ANGELES MAN MURDERS WIFE

Is Preparing to Slay Four Children When the Neighbors Interfere

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 26.—(U.P.)—R. R. Reynolds, 46 real estate broker, shot and killed his wife today and was lining up his four children along a wall for a similar purpose when neighbors interfered, according to the police. The alleged slayer is held in the county jail.

"I'm a good shot," he shouted after he had killed his wife. He is believed to be demented.

Pythian Sisters Plan Convention

Pythian Sisters of Ashland and other parts of Jackson county are planning on going to Grants Pass Friday where the district convention for this year will be held. Lodge members from Jackson, Josephine and Douglas counties make up the district convention. A big program is being arranged for the visiting delegates which will conclude with a banquet Friday evening.

Many Boxes Of Apples Shipped

PORTLAND, Ore., May 26.—A total of 956,261 boxes of apples were shipped from Portland during the 1925-1926 season, according to a current report of the Port of Portland.

A total of 785,722 boxes went to the British Isles, 115,139 boxes to Russia, Germany, Holland, and Austria. One shipment of 756 boxes went to Tien Tsin, China.

London led all cities in importing Oregon apples. The port received 316,402 boxes.

VALUED MOONSHINE IS TAKEN IN RAID NEAR OREGON CITY

Illicit Liquor Valued At \$16,250 Captured by Deputy Sheriffs

OREGON CITY, Ore., May 25.—Sufficeit finished and unfinished moonshine liquor to fill nearly sixty-five hundred pint orders, for which a ready market awaits, figured in a raid when James Cerani and Lou Albina were arrested near Milwaukie.

The raid was made by Sheriff Mass and Deputy Sheriffs Eddy, Thompson and Staats.

The men are held in jail, and will have a hearing in justice court.

At current market prices, the haul would have brought some \$16,250, had the raid been deferred long enough for the liquor to be finished and marketed.

The proceeds of the raid included 10 gallons of finished liquor, 800 gallons of liquor nearing completion in mash, a 50-gallon container and other things requisite for the operation of a going concern in the wholesale moonshine line.

Oregon Caves Has Healthy Increase In Tourist Travel

GRANTS PASS, May 26.—Tourist travel to the Oregon Caves is increasing and already there have been three times as many people through the caverns as there were at the same time last season. The official count shows that 678 people have registered for the trip through, not counting Cavemen who were there on May 1. This lacks just three of being three times greater as on the same day in 1925. Sunday 81 people went through.

Girl Member Of Gang Is Missing

CHICAGO, May 26.—The disappearance of pretty Mildred Kavanaugh, 20, today added to the mystery surrounding the death of Frank Cremaldi, latest Chicago gang-war victim. Miss Kavanaugh was seen, according to investigators, in the company of Cremaldi a short time before his bullet-riddled body was found on a country road in Leydon township.

Admits Passing Many Bad Checks

PORTLAND, Ore., May 26.—Admission that during the past two years he had passed nearly \$5000 worth of fictitious checks in Portland was made by Roy Shelton, 27, police reported. He was arrested by Patrolmen Russell and Parker. In his room the police reported finding a varied assortment of stamps and checks.

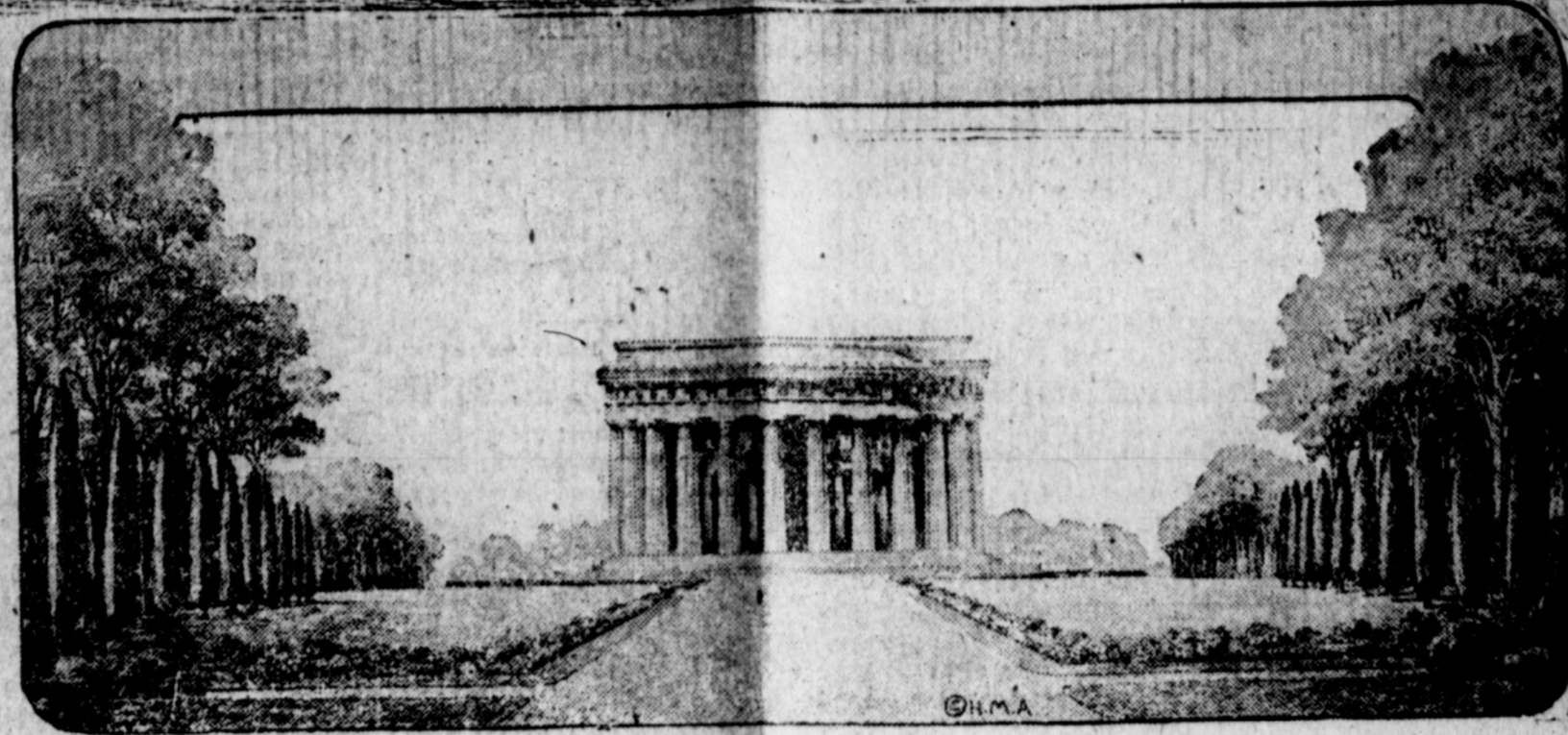
Oldsmobile Films Attract Interest

With Gwin Butler, Geo. Hargadine and other pioneers, Mr. Garrett ran cattle in the Dead Indian country in his youthful days.

The family will remain here for the remainder of the week while Mr. Garrett visits with former friends. They are stopping at the Lithia Park camp.

"Miss Chamberlain must be kept quiet for a few days longer. They both wish to thank their Ashland friends for being so thoughtful of them. Miss Palmer has no bones broken and will be able to be about quite soon. She says that neither of them has any recollection of what happened. The first thing they knew of the accident was finding themselves in the hospital."

"When we return through Red Bluff on our trip home, we expect to stop in again to visit them."

Congress Renews Coolidge Attack

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 26.—(U.P.)—Congress today renewed its attack on President Coolidge's order authorizing state, county and municipal officers to serve as federal dry agents at nominal salaries. An opinion by Attorney General Sargent holding the order as legal was not accepted as final.

PARIS, May 26.—(U.P.)—Former Premier Petlioura of Ukraine was assassinated yesterday. Schwartzbar Samuel was arrested shortly after and confessed to the killing. Petlioura was shot seven times. He had been running an anti-Semetic newspaper here.

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Coolidge Opens Plants With Telegraph Key

TACOMA, May 26.— Tacoma's new \$5,250,000 hydro-electric unit of the Cushman power project was put in operation officially, early this afternoon by means of a telegraph key carried to him by James Mosolf of Lincoln high school.

As the president pressed the key at 12:30 p. m., Tacoma time, an electric impulse was transmitted directly to the Cushman dam over the wires of a telegraph company and the city's own line from the sub-station here to the power plant 75 miles away.

FAULTY BRAKES ARE CAUSE OF ACCIDENT

California tourists Badly Shaken Up in Accident On Siskiyou

The brakes giving way was the cause of an accident on the Siskiyou yesterday. In order to stop the car it was turned into the bank, turning completely over. The occupants of the car, Mrs. Grace Lenthall and father, E. G. Goodwin, of Oakland, were not hurt, just badly shaken up. They are stopping at the Hotel Ashland waiting repairs on their car before going on to Vancouver, B. C.

Ashland Has 35 In Health Club

Ashland recruited 35 members for the Jackson County Health Association during the membership drive here last month, according to an official report received today from the association headquarters. There are now 386 members in the association, the largest in its history, which is officials of the organization.

Big Sum Will Be Spent For Roads

PORTLAND, Ore., May 26.—(U.P.)—Nearly a half million dollars are available for construction of forest highways this season, according to radio advices received here today. Roads to be built include the Medford-Crater Lake road at \$50,000, and the Klamath Falls-Lakeview road at \$75,000.

NOTED EDUCATOR TO SPEAK AT OPENING OF ASHLAND NORMAL

Dr. Henry Suzzalo of Uni- versity of Washington Coming June 26th

Dr. Henry Suzzalo, president of the University of Washington, will deliver the main address at the dedication and formal opening of the new Southern Oregon normal school at Ashland in June 26. The announcement was made yesterday by J. A. Churchill, president-elect of the school.

The invitation to Dr. Suzzalo was extended by the board of regents. "Expert Service in Teaching" will be his subject.

Edgar H. Sensesich, president of the West Coast National bank of Portland, who after June 18, will be grand master of the Masonic lodge in Oregon, will lay the corner stone on the same date. The stone will be of Ashland granite.

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Gigantic Liquor Cache Uncovered At San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., May 26.—(U.P.)—"Coppa's Neptune Palace," a marble swimming tank of the Barbary coast day's contained water before prohibition but is now filled with wine. Dry agents discovered a huge liquor cache within a few hundred feet of the hall of justice following the explosion of a gigantic still in a corner of the abandoned bath house. Ten thousand gallons of barreled wine, three auto trucks and complete liquor making equipment were confiscated.

Profanity Hill Will Be Improved

SEATTLE, Wash., May 26.—"Profanity Hill" may go begging for a more appropriate name if new street improvements are put through as proposed.

Seattle's "cursed" mountain so named because many a teamster, many an autoist and many a pedestrian has sworn profusely in negotiating its summit, may be improved with new cuts and grades.

The hill came into its greatest notoriety when someone built the old King county courthouse on top of it. Since those days the building has been converted into a jail.

The Interstate Stage Line is running two stages each day beginning today, instead of one as formerly. Going to San Francisco the stages leave Ashland at 6:35 a. m. and 9:35 p. m., and going to Portland they leave at 1 a. m. and 10:55 a. m.

DEFENSE FOR EARL CARROLL ATTACKS GIRL

Joyce Hawley, Bathtub Bather, is Made Target of Chief Witness

MONEY DEMAND MADE Evidence Indicates Dancer De- manded \$1000 to Protect Man

NEW YORK, May 26.—(U.P.)—The defense in the Earl Carroll perjury case turned fire on Miss Joyce Hawley, the girl in the bathtub, today laying the ground work for the contention that she attempted to force Carroll to pay her for her appearance in the bathtub with the threat of telling the grand jury a damaging story.

Chris Scaife, Carroll's representative, testified that Miss Hawley first applied for a regular position following the party and later asked for money. Scaife testified that Miss Hawley said she was entitled to \$1000 and would make trouble for Carroll if she did not get it.

Scaife revealed himself in court as the custodian of the famous bathtub and said he had refilled the tub perhaps a dozen times. He denied there was any wine or champagne in the tub.

"It was Canada Dry Ginger ale," he told the jury.

HONOLULU FLIGHT AVIATOR INDICTED

SEATTLE, Wash., May 26.—(U.P.)—Lieutenant Commander James Hale Strong, naval aviator who commanded seaplane PB-1 in the San Francisco to Honolulu unsuccessful flight a year ago, was named in an indictment here in connection with the grand jury investigation of an alleged liquor smuggling ring, it was learned yesterday afternoon.

This information came to light when United States Marshal Ed Brenn reported to the court that he could not serve a secret warrant because Strong was not in his jurisdiction. Strong is now stationed on the airplane carrier Langley which is engaged in battle fleet maneuvers off the Southern California coast.
