**BROCCOLI GROWERS GET SMALL RETURNS**  
Roseburg news dispatches state that although broccoli growers of Douglas county harvested the biggest crops in the history of the industry during the season just past, the returns for the season indicate that the profit was small. The returns were sufficient to pay the crop expense, but the gains were far occasioned by the exceptionally large crop in both Oregon and California, causing the market to decline to the lowest figure ever paid. The growers received as low as 50 cents a crate.—Medford Mail Tribune.

The law was enacted in 1907. If the girls are going to obey the law they will have to dig up some old style books of nearly two decades ago and see just what was being worn.
