IS EXPERIENCED MAN

Appointee Comes Well Recommended; C. V. Howell to Teach School

Announcement was made today by directors of the Ashland Young Men's Christian Association of the appointment of W. P. Walter of Eugene as full-time secretary for Ashland, starting September 1.

With his wife and son, Charles, Mr. Walter was here yesterday enroute to Dunsmuir, Cal., where he will attend a regional conference of Y. M. C. A. secretaries. Following this meeting he will enjoy a needed vacation in various parts of California.

Mr. Walter comes to Ashland highly recommended as a Y. M. C. A. official, and the Ashland directors said today they were highly gratified to secure a man with as much training as successful experience. He has been boys' work secretary at Eugene for the past five years. He also was in the Y. M. C. A. work at Astoria and Salem. At the present time he is president of the Association of Boys' Work Secretaries for the Northwest. He stopped here enroute to California at the request of the Ashland directors, and following a conference with them accepted the local appointment.

C. V. Howell, who has been serving the local board for the past two years as a part-time secretary, desired to leave the association work in order that he might go on with his high school work on full time. He will teach in the junior high school this fall.

On account of this change it was necessary for the board to get a new secretary either on full time or part time, and after a careful survey of the local field it was decided the time has come when a full-time secretary should carry on the work in this city. Members of the board said that Mr. Howell's work had made a good foundation for a full-time worker and Mr. Walter can undoubtedly follow this up and reach a larger number of boys.

DYNAMITE FAILS TO BRING FORTH BODY OF MRS. McPHERSON

No Trace Yet Found of Evangelist Who Disappeared Two Weeks Ago

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 3. — (UP)—Kenneth G. Orniston, former radio operator at Angelus Temple, Los Angeles, made a flimsy entry, "Mr. and Mrs. Frank Gibson, Los Angeles," on the register of a San Luis Obispo hotel last Saturday, according to Herman Cline, Los Angeles captain of detectives, who was here today.

Cline said he obtained the information at San Luis Obispo yesterday. He hopes to establish the identity of the heavily veiled woman with the man who registered as Gibson. Cline refused to say whether or not he thought the woman was Mrs. Almee McPherston.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 3. — (UP)—Although dynamiting operations were under way all yesterday afternoon, no trace has yet been found of the body of Mrs. Almee Temple McPherston, who is believed to have been drowned while swimming near here two weeks ago.

The dynamiting operations were conducted by Captain Fred Henderson, deep sea diver, who was employed by Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, mother of Mrs. McPherston. It was decided to use explosives on the theory that the evangelist's body might have become entangled in a kelp bed near Castle Rock, north of the spot where she disappeared. Mrs. Kennedy repeated her belief that her daughter had been drowned.

The dead are Mrs. Regina Ember, Dr. Ember's wife, their 6 year old son and a white maid. Dr. Ember was seriously burned before being rescued from the roof. The dead were trapped in bedrooms.

House Approves War Debt Plans

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 3. — (UP)—The \$4,000,025,000 war debt settlement with France was ratified by the house late yesterday and now goes to the senate where it faces a hard battle. The settlement proposed funding the debt over a period of 62 years. The payments will begin with \$30,000,000 for the first two years and gradually increase thereafter.

EARL CARROLL SENTENCED TO PENITENTIARY

"Wine Bath" Producer Gets One Year in Federal Prison at Atlanta

APPEAL TO BE TAKEN

Broadway Theater Owner Faces Cell for Disgraceful Party Staged

NEW YORK CITY, June 3. — (UP)—Earl Carroll, theatrical producer, was today sentenced to one year and one day in the federal penitentiary at Atlanta and fined \$2000 for telling a federal grand jury that nobody bathed in a tub of champagne at a party he gave in his theatre on the night of February 22.

The sentence was passed by Federal Judge Henry Goddard in accordance with Carroll's conviction returned by a jury a week ago on two counts of perjury. Attorneys for the Broadway theatre man announced they would file an appeal, and Carroll's sojourn in the federal prison will be delayed until final action is taken on appeal.

Carroll's conviction was based on the testimony of Joyce Hawley, 17-year-old chorus girl, who testified that she was piled with drinks and then ordered to disrobe and get in the tub of liquor during a riotous party on the stage of the theatre. Guests of the Broadway producer refused to incriminate him when they were called as witnesses, and attorneys for Carroll claimed as a defense that the chorus girl was trying to "shake him down" for a large sum of money on threat of getting him into trouble.

Fat Prisoner Is Caught By Bars

PHILADELPHIA, June 3. — In an attempted jail break two prisoners managed to get out, although they were captured before they got out of the prison court. Martin Blake, however, was unable to get through the small opening sawed out, and after being stuck fast for an hour, he was finally hauled back by other prisoners who indignantly blamed him for holding back their own escape.

ALL RECORDS SHATTERED AT THIS SESSION

More Bills Were Introduced in Present Congress Than Ever Before BUT FEW ARE PASSED

Out of Nearly 17,000 Introduced, Only 375 Given Final Approval

WASHINGTON, June 3. — (UP)—Whatever other fame it achieves, the present congress will set up one record that probably will stand for a long time—the number of bills its members poured into the hoppers of house and senate.

More bills have been introduced this year than in any other single session of congress, according to veteran employes who have counted them for years. "Would Face Deficit" If all the bills and resolutions were enacted, the treasury would face a deficit of billions of dollars, the country would be dotted with new and strange projects of all kinds, procedure would be established and the constitution would have a new face.

There have been introduced during the 134 days of this session a grand total of 16,906 bills, an average of 127 a day, of which 12,530 have been presented to the house, and 4,375 to the senate. This is the record for one session, half of the 69th congress, and its surpasses that for the whole of the 68th congress, which was 16,884. At the present rate the record for the 69th congress will be 33,910.

To date only 375 bills have been enacted into law this session, slightly over two per cent of those proposed.

SENATE WILL PROBE PRIMARY CAMPAIGNS

Ten Thousand Dollars Given For Thorough Investigation of Expenses

WASHINGTON, D. C. June 3. — (UP)—The senate today appropriated \$10,000 for a special committee to conduct a thorough investigation of primary campaign expenditures throughout the country. The resolution was introduced by Senator Reed, a democrat of Missouri. Reports are coming in of extravagant campaign expenditures in many states. Senator Reed is expected to be chosen chairman of the committee.

Vining's Address At Petaluma Held Real Inspiration

PARIS, June 3. — (UP)—Helen Wills, American women's tennis champion, yesterday won the first round of her match in the French national tennis championship. She defeated Mme. Golding, 6-3 and 7-5. The California girl is off her game and suffering from a bad cold.

Coos Rancher Is Victim Of Murder

POWERS, Ore., June 3. — (UP)—William Whobry, 47, a rancher, was murdered, and his nephew, Clifford Alfred, 22, a logger, was injured in some mysterious manner on the highway three miles south of here shortly before midnight.

VICE CONSUL FOR MEXICO IS JAILED ON BOOZE CHARGE

Two Companions Also Taken Into Custody Near Santa Ana, Cal.

SANTA ANA, Cal., June 3. — (UP)—Lamberto H. Obregon, 23, Mexican vice consul at Los Angeles, and nephew of former President Alvaro Obregon of Mexico, was held in the Orange county jail today on a double charge of reckless driving and possession of liquor.

The young diplomat was arrested on the San Diego highway with two companions after a chase by road cops of several miles. Two companions, B. C. Hill, 24, attache of the Mexican consulate in Los Angeles, and G. Insumga, 25, were taken into custody also. They were accused of possession of liquor.

OKLAHOMA STORMS BRING BIG DAMAGE

Two Lives Lost and Crops Ruined by Terrific Rain and Wind Outburst

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., June 3. — (UP)—Two lives were lost and thousands of dollars in crop damage done by terrific wind and rain storms which swept Oklahoma last night. Four persons who were swept away by swollen streams near Hominy last night were missing this morning. The body of Mrs. Ruth Bailey was recovered from Hominy creek today.

Adam L. Adams was killed by lightning at Drumright. Oklahoma's bumper wheat crop was leveled in many sections and hundreds were driven from their homes by rain which caused streams to flood.

TWO MORE DEAD IN CHICAGO BEER WAR

Reputed Liquor Runners Murdered and Other Injured; Total Now 98

CHICAGO, June 3. — (UP)—Two more men were murdered and a third was wounded yesterday in what police believe to have been a gang outbreak in Hyde Park. All three victims were bootleg stand operators and are believed to have been interested in the alcoholic traffic as a sideline. This brings Chicago's beer murders to a total of 98.

CHARGES DENIED BY LONG BELL COMPANY

Promotion of Longview, Wn., Not Against Public Good, is Claim

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., June 3. — (UP)—Attorneys for the Long Bell company today filed an answer in the supreme court to the quo warranto suit instituted by Attorney General Gentry to revoke the company's charter for its promotion of Longview, Wash. The answer declared that none of the activities complained of were harmful but were in accord with settled practice in Missouri. On the contrary, the answer claims the activities are in accord with public welfare.

Ernest J. Hicks Funeral Is Held

Funeral services were held yesterday for Ernest J. Hicks, well-known Ashland resident, who died suddenly Memorial day from apoplexy. Services were conducted at the Dodge chapel by members of the Knights of Pythias, of which he had been a member. Burial was in Hargadine cemetery.

OFFICIALS IN KLAMATH NOW HOT ON TRAIL

Reward of \$1000 for Bomb Plotters Spurs Officers Into Activity

HOT CLUES REPORTED

Attempt on Life of District Attorney Elliott May be Solved Soon

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 3. — (Special) — Local peace officers, private detectives and others renewed their investigations into the recent bombing of the home of District Attorney Elliott of Klamath county, following announcement from Salem that Governor Pierce has offered a reward of \$1000 for the apprehension of the bomb plotters. Several clues are reported to be occupying the attention of several officers, who hope to be able to report arrests within a short time, it was reported here this morning.

Atrocious Crime

"The explosion of the bomb," says the governor's proclamation, "partially wrecked the building, several members of the district attorney's family narrowly escaping death. This is one of the most atrocious crimes ever attempted in the state of Oregon. In the absence of evidence to the contrary, it is to be presumed that this attempt upon the lives of the district attorney and his family resulted from prosecution of criminal cases in that county, and is a direct blow aimed at our government and law enforcement officers."

AUTO DRIVER HELD FOR WOMAN'S DEATH

Bend Man Charged With Manslaughter Following Report of Jurors

BEND, Ore., June 3. — (UP)—Charges of manslaughter were filed yesterday afternoon against A. L. Schick, driver of an automobile which fatally injured Mrs. Laura Crater earlier in the week. Schick was arrested following a coroner's jury verdict which held the woman's death was caused by reckless driving. The fatal accident occurred near Tumalo when the car struck Mrs. Crater, who was walking along the highway.

Aged Husband Is Looking For Wife And Adopted Son

NEW YORK, June 3. — Col. J. J. Lewis is looking for an ingrate whom he took to his heart as a foster son rescued from dire poverty, and who, he says, rewarded his benefactor by running off with the young wife of Col. Lewis. Another charge filed, is being alleged that the runaway also took several thousand dollars belonging to the colonel, who is 70, while his wife is 22. The foster son is Clarence V. Thompson, former worker at an east side helping hand mission for outcasts.
