FAMOUS SPHINX REVEALED FOR FIRST TIME IN YEARS

CAIRO, (UP)—For the first time in 2,300 years the Sphinx is now entirely visible. The accumulation of sand which since Ptolemaic times has been filling up the depression in which the Sphinx stands and which had buried all but the head, back and shoulders of the Sphinx, has been carried away by an army of workers and this seventh Wonder of the World today again stands fully revealed.

No less than 800 boys and girls and a large corps of skilled masons have been employed for months in the excavation and re-creation of the Sphinx.

These youngsters worked in gangs each with its own special singer who chanted all day long little meaningless Arabic ditties which the gangs of dark-skinned children took up and chanted themselves as they streamed up and down the sides of the ever-deepening hole from which the immense bulk of the Sphinx slowly emerged as the work progressed. Once again the giant paws have come to light in their entirety and between them has been found still intact the tiny shrine built by Thotmes about

2,000 B. C. This was last examined during some minor excavations in 1817.

The memorial steps to this shrine bears an interesting inscription describing how the Sphinx appeared to the Prince in a vision when he had fallen asleep in its shade after a hunting expedition. In his dream the Sphinx told the Prince that he would become King, but made him promise to clear his image from the sand in which it had become buried. Subsequently the Prince came to the throne as Thotmes IV., and the monument records that in the first year of his reign he fulfilled his dream-promise.

Thotmes IV. also caused all but the head of the Sphinx to be encased in limestone masonry about a foot thick to protect it against the wear of time. This masonry covering is still perfect on the enormous paws and lower parts of the monument. Some of the red pigment with which the monument was covered also remains, and on the breast are traces of the huge statue of the king who originally had the Sphinx produced.

The Sphinx as now uncovered is about 240 feet long from the end of the paws to the end of the haunches and is about 65 feet high from the base to the crown of the head. In the head there is a hollow about six feet deep and another about two feet deep near the left forehead where attempts have been made to discover treasures that were reputed to have been hidden at some unknown period.

The Sphinx faces due east and since he was first cut from virgin rock has greeted the rising sun more than 2,000,000 times. Its Egyptian name is Abu Hol, "the Father of Fear."

NOTICE To Water Users

YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED that on and after June 5, 1923, the city of Ashland will be divided into two districts, Upper and Lower, for irrigation purposes, the dividing line being the Boulevard and Main streets.

UPPER DISTRICT

That portion of the city lying above the Boulevard and Main streets to be known as the Upper District, will be allowed to use water for irrigation and sprinkling purposes on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 8 a. m. to 10 a. m., and from 5 p. m. to 10 p. m., and on Sundays from 5 a. m. to 10 a. m.

LOWER DISTRICT

That portion of the city lying below the Boulevard and Main streets, to be known as the Lower District, will be allowed to use water for irrigation and sprinkling purposes on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, from 5 a. m. to 10 a. m., and from 5 p. m. to 10 p. m., and on Sundays from 5 p. m. to 10 p. m.

The use of water through meters will not be under these restrictions.

Public parks in their respective districts will irrigate between the hours of 10 a. m., and 5 p. m.

Water must be turned off immediately in case of fire.

Do not use open hose or open fances where you are paying for 10,000 or 20,000 square feet. Use either spray nozzle or hose with nozzle not more than 1-4 inch in diameter.

Do not set sprinkler so it will interfere with traffic on sidewalk.

Do not have leaky faucets, toilets or fixtures on your premises.

Do not allow water to run off your property on the streets, gutters or alleys.

Do not run water at night between the hours of 10 p. m., and 5 a. m., in either division.

The above notice covering Ashland Creek Water as used for irrigation.

Talent Irrigation water or the ditch water will be restricted to time as given the ditch attendant.

Those under ditch system will be required to use ditch water in place of Ashland Creek water.

No pipe lines from Ditch System connected to Ashland Creek System.

German Physician To Try Once More

SAN FRANCISCO, June 3.—How a hard-working German doctor lost, on the third trial, his chance to practice in America by the small margin of a split initiative or a dangling particle is related by the state board of medical examiners.

Three times the young doctor sought permission of the state examiners to practice in California, and three times it was refused. Disappointment was so keen the third time that the youth broke down and cried.

The first time he found that an M. D. degree was needed, though he had already spent years in study of medicine. He returned to Germany and earned his degree. When he returned he met another difficulty, the English language. He took two examinations, passing the second with a grade of 74 1-3. The passing grade is 75.

With dogged perseverance he has set to work again, this time to forget his medical knowledge while he studies the English language.

CHINESE MOBS BEAT FOREIGNERS IN RIOT

SHANGHAI, June 2.—Forty foreigners were stoned and beaten by Chinese mobs Sunday night following anniversary demonstrations over the shooting of Chinese students by British soldiers a year ago.

Fifteen civilian volunteer troops patrolled the city following

the disorders, as it was feared that the riot, which subsided after the attacks, might be repeated. The general manager of the French street car system, M. Vialy was seriously injured in the disorders here before the volunteer police quelled the disorder. One Chinese was killed by the foreign volunteers.
