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MANY LEADERS TO ANGLE FOR COOLIDGE JOB

Republican Politicians Are Amazed at Number of Candidates in Field

BORAH GETS ACTIVE

Anti-World Court Solon Gains Ground; Other Prospects Are Listed

WASHINGTON, June 4.—Hats are falling into the ring for President Coolidge's job so fast that politicians here are amazed.

Senator William E. Borah, anti-world court dry, Vice-President Charles G. Dawes, Senator Jim Watson, leader of the Indiana republican organization and former Gov. Frank O. Lowden of Illinois, have made recent gestures indicating they would not refuse the 1928 republican presidential nomination.

Convention Time Near

With the next republican convention about two years off, and no word from the White House as to whether Mr. Coolidge will seek another term unusual significance is being attached to recent developments.

Besides the four mentioned, a dozen others are in the background, led by Speaker Nicholas Longworth of Ohio; Secretary of Commerce Hoover of California, and Senator Wadsworth, the New York vet.

While anything may happen in two years to boost or kill the chances of the leading quartet, here is the situation as interpreted by politicians here:

Borah Boom Launched

Borah—his dry Baltimore speech gained him welcome leadership of dry republicans in congress as their prospective candidate. His boom was first launched in his home state of Idaho after his fight against the World Court in the senate this spring. Further impetus was given to the movement in Illinois, when he aided the anti-World Court campaign of Col. Frank Smith in his successful primary fight against Senator William B. McKinley for the republican senatorial nomination.

He has been as close to Mr. Coolidge as few others in congress. He declined the vice-presidency as Mr. Coolidge's running mate in 1924. He apparently has no political organization as yet. But the dries could make one for him.

Borah is regarded as a liberal and a staunch advocate of far-reaching farm relief. He has come into conflict with the administration repeatedly upon foreign policy.

Dawes Likely Candidate

Dawes—his championship of revision of senate rules in his inaugural speech and subsequent campaign were hailed as a forecast that he would enter the 1928 ring. But his candidacy has been given a recent spurt because of an announcement that he believes the "equalization fee" system of stabilizing farm prices is economically sound, although that view is directly opposed to the view of the president.

He made a national rules campaign last summer and will con-

CRATER LAKE LODGE TO BE OPEN JULY 1

Everything in Readiness for Record-Breaking Crowd Says E. W. Price

6 NEW STAGES READY

Trout Striking Better This Year; Road Work is Now Being Rushed

Everything is in readiness for the opening of Crater Lake lodge in Crater Lake National Park on July 1. This is the work brought back to Ashland last night by E. W. Price, managing director of the Crater Lake Lodge company, who, with Joe Hermann, manager of the lodge, has been on a tour of inspection at the park.

The first crew of summer employees will be taken to the lodge on June 25th, Mr. Price said, and the remainder will follow a few days later so that everything will be in readiness on July 1. He is looking forward to the greatest tourist travel this year in the history of the park.

Six new motor stages will be in service this year between Medford and Klamath Falls. These are seven-passenger Hudson sedans, which have just arrived at the Portland branch and are now being conditioned for the hard season of travel over the Klamath and Medford routes.

Paving Work On

The paving work within the park is progressing at a rapid rate and much of it will be completed by July 1, said Mr. Price. "The snow is practically gone from around the lodge and the road is now open to the rim. There are several disagreeable detours to be made at the present time, but this will be eliminated by the time the lodge is open.

"The boys at the lake report that fishing is far better now than in many years. The trout are much fatter than last year and are putting up a battle that makes angling worth while."

Mr. Price said that all of the employees for the summer season have been signed up and there will be no vacant jobs. Most of those to be employed are college students and over 70 percent of them have worked at the park during the past few years.

EX-COLLEGE MAN IS GIVEN STIFF JOLT

Dick Whittemore Denied New Trial On Murder Charge

BALTIMORE, Md., June 4.—(UP)—The supreme court refused a new trial to Richard Reese Whittemore, the "candy sheik" who was found guilty of first degree murder.

Whittemore faces hanging or life imprisonment, Judge Eugene O'Dunne said he would sentence Whittemore when Edgar Allen Poe, his counsel, returns from Princeton, probably Monday.

C., June 4.—A report holding President Coolidge's executive prohibition order was "harmless" and of no serious legal import was submitted to the senate judiciary committee today by the sub-committee which had been directed to investigate the order. The report was drawn by Senator Walsh. The committee found minor objections and final consideration was put over until tomorrow.

AUTO BANDITS GET \$20,000 FROM BANK

Four Armed Men Hold up 12 Clerks and Escape With Large Amount

DALLAS, Texas, June 4.—Four masked white men forced 12 clerks into the vault of the Jefferson Bank & Trust company, in Oak Cliff, a suburb, shortly before noon today, and escaped in an automobile with \$20,000 cash. After locking the vault door the bandits, working calmly and with no apparent hurry, scooped up all the money in sight.

YOUTH FACES PROSECUTION AS MURDERER

Cook County Prosecutor to File Charge Against Young Logger

FOR SLAYING UNCLE

Authorities Place Little Credence in Story of Having Been Attacked

COQUILLE, Ore., June 4.—(UP)—A murder charge probably will be filed before night against Clifford Alfred, 20-year-old logger, as a result of the mysterious slaying of his uncle, William Whorrey, 47, of Brantford, on the highway near Powers Wednesday night.

This announcement was made today noon by District Attorney J. B. Bedingfield following an investigation into the mysterious case. Alfred is the only person who holds a key to the solution of the crime with the possible exception of other parties whom he claims attacked him and his uncle as they were driving along the lonely highway.

The nephew claims the attackers knocked him unconscious and killed his uncle by smashing his head with an automobile jack.

"He told lots of stories," was Bedingfield's only comment after questioning the youth for more than two hours.

Young Alfred has been held in the county jail since the crime first was discovered as suspicion was directed at him from the very start, officials said.

ILL HEALTH CAUSES GREWSOME TRAGEDY

Pennsylvania Man Attacks Wife and Son and Then Commits Suicide

LANSDALE, Pa., June 4.—(UP)—Receipt of a special delivery letter warning that something tragic had happened, led police to the home of Robert Norton Hill today, revealing an attempt to wipe out the entire family.

Hill was found dead in the basement of the home with a bullet through his head and with his wrists slashed. His son, Paul, 20, was found with his head battered and with a bullet wound. His wife was found unconscious with her head battered. It is thought both wife and son will die.

Despondency over the family's health is thought to have caused the husband to attempt to wipe out the entire family.

Says Girl Comes Of Crook Family

CHICAGO, June 4.—Testifying that Hazel West, charged with felony, was "queen of an underworld ring," Detective Mahoney said the whole family were crooks and her father was in prison. "So your ole man," exclaimed Hazel, flippantly. Whereat Detective Mahoney replied: "No, but YOUR ole man is in jail, doing two years."

MANY PERSONS ARE SLAIN IN FEDERAL PROHIBITION WORK

Dry Chief Andrews Issues Orders to Men; Sleuths Are Endangered

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 4.—(UP)—Gun battles between federal dry agents and bootleggers, moonshiners and rum runners resulted in 140 casualties since prohibition became effective, the United Press learned today from official figures.

Because of the growing fatality list, Dry Chief Andrews has ordered federal agents to use weapons only in emergencies and to shoot only in self defense.

There have been 49 prohibition officers killed in the line of duty, while 92 persons resisting or evading arrest have been slain by federal agents. Most of the officers were killed while raiding stills although several were murdered to prevent their giving evidence at trials.
