A carload of luscious Bing cherries, of perfect size and expertly packed, left Ashland last night for Chicago, from which point they will be diverted into the best eastern markets.

Another carload of these cherries has been shipped to an eastern market for the retail trade, according to S. D. Taylor, manager of the Ashland Fruit and Produce Association, who supervised the packing of the cherries and procured the market for them.

The cherries all were grown in or near Ashland and are in every sense an Ashland product. Every box of cherries contains a stenciled label of Ashland, which, as a result, should obtain some valuable advertising for her fruits.

Mr. Taylor further announced that a ready market has been procured for Ashland peaches and 2 more pretentious label has been designed for them. The peaches likewise will be shipped east for retail consumption.

This was the statement yesterday of Roy Klein, state highway engineer, to C. C. Seeley, resident highway engineer.

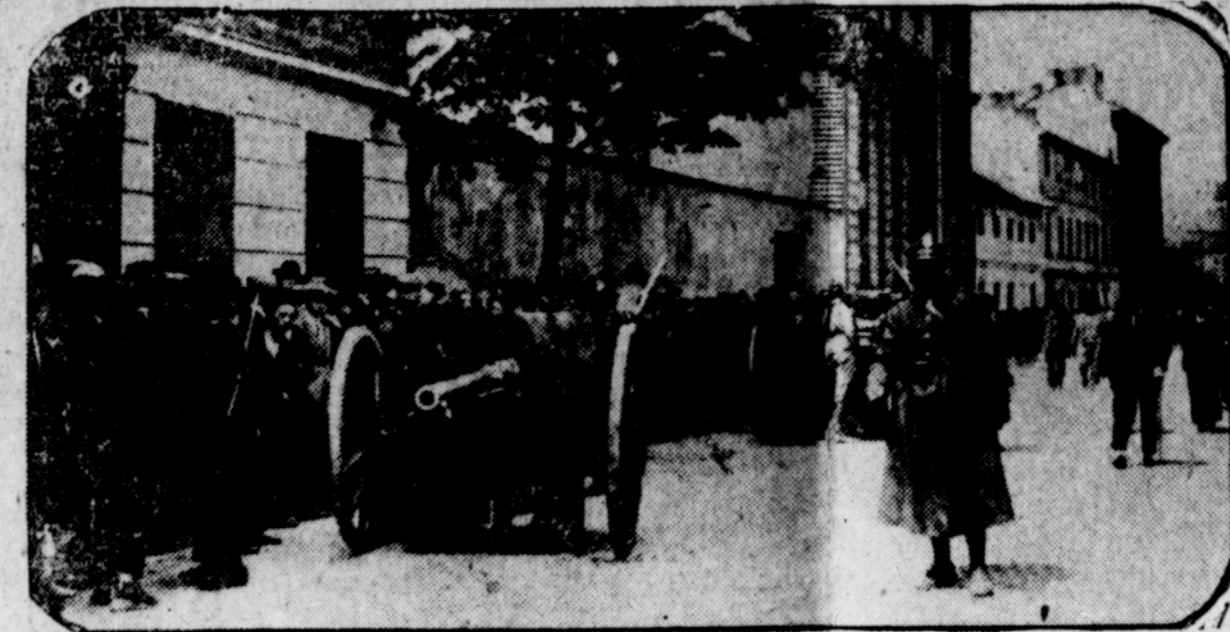
"Wherever we start oiling communities invariably ask for more," Klein explained to the resident engineer. "So we must adhere to our original plan, for which we appropriated a specific amount."

STARVATION KILLS SIBERIAN NATIVES

Hundreds Lose Lives When Supplies Fail to Reach Far North Settlement

NOME, Alaska, June 5.—(UP)—Hundreds of Siberian natives are dead from starvation and many others took their own lives to avoid a similar fate when food and hunting supplies failed to reach them at Indian Point settlement, across Bering Strait from Alaska.

News of the plight of the Russian trappers was given by Captain Ira Rank of the schooner Trader, who has returned here after a 10 day trading trip to Little Diomed Island. He said he learned that the soviet government failed to furnish supplies or hunting equipment. Unable to hunt, the natives ate their dogs but even these were not sufficient to tide them over the winter.

Millerand Comes Back In Politics

PARIS, June 5.—Alexandre Millerand, former premier and minister of foreign affairs and president of France from 1920 until 1924, has returned to the forefront of French politics to attack Germany and soviet Russia and to sound a solemn warning against "Illusions of Locarno."

Former Champion Held For Assault

PASADENA, Cal., June 5.—Billy Papke, former world's middleweight champion, was arrested here yesterday on a charge of assault and battery.

Complaint was filed by Charles F. Featherstone, who claims the former pugilist threw him bodily from his home because he brought his dog with him on a visit.

People of That State Not Interested Says Governor Ben S. Paulen

TOPEKA, Kan., June 5.—(UP)—Either a state or nation referendum on prohibition would be defeated 10 to 1 in Kansas, in the opinion of Governor Ben S. Paulen.

In a statement the Kansas governor further expressed his views as follows:

"We are very well satisfied in Kansas with the operation of the prohibition law. The question of a good prohibition referendum is not of vital concern and is not urged or demanded by our people."

Much Lumber Lost In Tacoma Blaze

TACOMA, Wash., June 5.—One million feet of lumber was destroyed in a fire believed of incendiary origin at the Foster-Newbegin company mill at Frederickson, south of here on the Milwaukee railroad national park branch. The damage is estimated at \$30,000, covered by insurance.

CITIZENS ARE TOLD TO SAVE WATER SUPPLY

City Manager Malone Appeals to Residents to Cooperate With City

REGULATIONS FIXED

Inspector to Start Next Week to Inspect Faucets in City Limits

City Manager Clyde A. Malone today issued an urgent appeal to all Ashland residents to conserve the water supply as much as possible during the coming summer months. Unless real economy in the use of water is shown, more stringent measures must be taken, he said.

"I am asking that the people, as a matter of civic loyalty and good citizenship, observe the special water regulations which have been adopted," he said. "We must face facts just as they are. The water supply is low, and will not be sufficient to carry us through the summer unless extreme caution is shown.

Real Saving Urged
"We are asking that people not only observe the regulatory hours, but that they likewise watch their gardens and lawns and shut off the water even before the hours are up, if their places have been sufficiently irrigated.

"Last year the water hours did not go into effect until July 25th, but in 1924, it was necessary to curtail the use of water early in May. We will have sufficient water for all purposes this summer if every resident of Ashland shows real economy and aids us in conservation.

Inspector Hired
"The city is putting on an inspector the first of the week who will inspect all faucets both in the houses and yards. If any bad leaks are discovered they must be repaired immediately. If the householder shows no inclination to repair them, the city will do so and charge it up against the property.

"We want to be fair with every water consumer in Ashland, but we also want them to be fair with the city. If a proper spirit of cooperation is shown, there will be plenty of water for all purposes, and lawns and gardens will not suffer as a result of the summer regulations."

State Rights Are Upheld By Solon

COLUMBUS, O., June 5.—Accusing the republican administration of "invading state rights," United States Senator W. H. King of Utah, sounded what was termed the "battle cry of national democracy," at a state-wide democratic rally here.

"The most important issue before the people today," Senator King declared, discussing President Coolidge's recent executive order commissioning state and county officials as prohibition agents, "is the preservation of individual rights.

Feminine Juror Forgets Cooking

DEROIT, Mich., June 5.—For more than fifty minutes a trial proceeded here with only 11 jurors. The 12th juror, Mrs. Nina Smith, after returning from the noon recess remembered that she had left a pot of beans on the fire and persuaded the judge to excuse her while she went home to remove them.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC TO START WORK ON KLAMATH TERMINAL

Will Break Ground For New Building This Month, Declares Official

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 5.—Ground for the new Southern Pacific \$800,000 terminal, in Klamath Falls will be broken within ten days; laying of heavy steel between Klamath Falls and the Grass Lake cut-off will be completed within 60 days; Erection of a few small bridges is all that remains to completion of the Natron cut-off; and by next September the Grass Lake to Ditz cut-off will be completed.

These were the announcements made last night by J. H. Dyer, general manager of the Southern Pacific railroad, who, with J. W. Fitzgerald, superintendent of the Shasta Division arrived in Klamath Falls last night after a visit of inspection on the Natron cut-off.

BAPTIST PREACHERS STAGE FIST FIGHT

Red Bluff Church Row Ends With Blood as Clergymen Have Battle

RED BLUFF, Cal., June 5.—(UP)—Two Baptist clergymen engaged in a fist fight last night in the presence of church members.

The argument began after the wife of the Rev. J. Brooks Frost, pastor of the Red Bluff Baptist church, refused to shake hands with the Rev. Gid Higginbottom.

There had been dissension in church ranks. Frost accused the evangelist of making an offensive remark to his wife, Higginbottom poked a fist at the pastor's son.

The fight raged furiously for some minutes. Both men had bleeding faces when the encounter ended.

CHILDREN KILLED IN RANCH HOME BLAZE

Tiny Tots Trapped in Flaming Dwelling Near Modesto, Calif.

MODESTO, Cal., June 5.—(UP)—Two children were burned to death late Thursday when fire destroyed the ranch home of Manuel T. Bettencourt, near Delhi.

Frederick Bettencourt, 8, and his 7-months-old brother, Edward, were trapped in the house by flames which started after the parents had left for Delhi. Men working in a nearby field saw the blaze but arrived too late to rescue the children.

Two Much Bridge Cause Of Divorce

JERSEY CITY, N. J., June 5.—Love of bridge kept her husband away nights at card tables and eventually caused him to desert her, Mrs. Mary Mahoney of Englewood alleges in her suit for divorce.

Nevada Senator In Liquor Case

CARSON CITY, Nev., June 5.—Charges linking United States Senator Tasker L. Oddie with the attempted suppression of liquor cases have been made by George Springwater, who is retiring as United States attorney for Nevada.

WOMAN FOUND AFTER SEARCH OF TWO WEEKS

Aimee Semple McPherson is Located in Canada by Private Detectives

TELEGRAM RECEIVED

No Details of Discovery Contained in Brief Message to Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 5.—Aimee Semple McPherson, missing evangelist, has been found in Edmonton, Canada, according to a telegram to Chief of Police James A. Davis.

The telegram was signed by Inspector Middleton of the International Detectives, who said she had been positively identified by three operatives of his agency.

No other information was contained in the wire, and police officials and authorities generally were awaiting further word from the Canadian city for further confirmation of the telegram.

EDMONTON, Canada, June 5.—(UP)—There is no record of Mrs. Aimee Semple McPherson, missing Los Angeles evangelist, according to officials of the Corona hotel here, where she is reported to have been located by a detective agency.

The hotel officials reported that a Miss Blanche Potter of Los Angeles had been staying at the hotel for more than two weeks and that a James H. Gould, also of Los Angeles, had been at the hotel for a month. These are the persons owning cars in which the evangelist is reported to have been seen. City officials launched an investigation in compliance with a request of California police officials.

Bankers Planning Tax Conferences
