## ASHLAND WINS EPIC CONTEST FROM LEADERS

Klamath Falls Ball Team Humbled, 7 to 6, in Driving Finish

**NINTH INNING RALLY**  
Pinch Hitters Save Day For Locals; Fast Game Given Sunday Crowd

This is the saga of an awakened Ashland; an epic of the blood-tugging realization of hope and faith. For Ashland's baseball club yesterday turned jeers into cheers when they humbled the mighty and hitherto invincible Klamath Pelicans in a driving finish which sent more than 500 frenzied fans into a delirium of joy.

It was one of those ninth inning rallies that are meant for the classics; a whirlwind attack in the closing minute of the game which left Klamath helpless and stunned, and which left Ashland perching proudly on the top of a 7 to 6 score.

It was the last of the ninth. Klamath was leading 6 to 3. Ashland came to bat for its final effort. Fans began starting for the gates for it seemed impossible that Ashland could win.

**Mohler Starts Fireworks**

Lefty Mohler, who had been pitching like a champion during the closing innings, came to the bat. He crashed out a single and ambled to first. Next came Mike Cassidy, first baseman with his three broken ribs. Another hit crashed through the tottering Klamath infield, and Mohler was resting on second.

Here is where Field Captain "Red" Watts started the strategy which won the game. He had not been hitting the Klamath pitchers, so he yanked himself from the lineup and sent in Billy Richardson to bat for him. His faith was rewarded when Richardson crashed another hit through the amazed and helpless infield, and three

## PLANE CRASH KILLS BOY AT GRANTS PASS

Ernest Phelps, 20, Dead and Earl Titus, 30, Not Expected to Live

**GOES INTO NOSE DIVE**  
Trial Spin of Repaired Airplane Results in Sunday Night Tragedy

GRANTS PASS, Ore., June 7. (Special)—Ernest Willard Phelps, aged 20, is dead, and Earl Titus, aged 30, is in a local hospital not expected to live as a result of an airplane crash at 8:15 o'clock here last night.

The plane which the young men were operating went into a nose dive at a height of about 500 feet and crashed into the middle of Third street, almost opposite the home of a local physician.

Young Phelps was killed instantly. Titus was badly crushed but still alive when they pulled him from beneath the mass of wreckage. He was rushed to a hospital but reports from there today were to the effect that he probably would die.

**Heard for Blocks**

The crash of the plane was heard for many blocks. It interrupted church services a short distance away and members of the congregation rushed from the building to view the wreckage.

The plane was one which crashed several weeks ago at Crescent City. It had been repaired by Titus who had repaired it, and with young Phelps as a passenger was making his first flight over the city.

According to reports from persons who witnessed the tragedy, the plane suddenly went into a nose spin and crashed to earth before the pilot could right it. The machine is a total wreck and it is uncertain if an examination will disclose just what went wrong with it.

Titus is married and has three children. Both young men have lived here for years and both were popular throughout the city.

## DEATH STALKS LAND AND AIR ALONG COAST

Eighteen Dead and Eight Dying is Week-End Toll For This Section

**AUTO TOLL IS HEAVY**  
Pleasure Seekers Maimed and Killed Over Sunday, Report Shows

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 7. (UP)—Eighteen persons are dead, eight dying and 56 injured as tragic death stalked Pacific coast pleasure hunters during the week-end play hours, according to the record compiled here today by the United Press. Death roamed the highways, entered the forests, visited rivers and beaches and invaded the air.

Nine were killed in automobile mishaps and at least seven of the other 40 victims were reported dying. Falling trees in a forest killed one. Two were killed by electrocution, one was killed in an airplane crash, three persons were drowned and there were two suicides.

Pacific northwest victims were: At Salem, W. B. Harris, a Central Point farmer, was killed in an auto crash. At Seaside, Mrs. R. L. Nugent, of Portland, was drowned in the surf. At Grants Pass Ernest Phelps was killed in an airplane crash. Near Klamath Falls Alden Whitney was killed in an automobile accident.

## LOCAL MAN IS DEAD IN CAR CRASH

Alden Whitney of Klamath Falls Killed Sunday on Green Springs Road

**AUTO GOES INTO DITCH**  
Carl Kimball, Driver, Tells Officers Version of Fatal Accident

Alden Foote Whitney, aged 37, former Ashland resident, was almost instantly killed on the Ashland-Klamath highway early yesterday morning when a light car in which he was riding overturned on a curve 30 miles west of Klamath Falls, pinning him beneath it.

Whitney sustained internal injuries from which he died within 20 minutes. The body was taken to Klamath Falls, where an inquest was to be held late this afternoon.

**Driver Escapes**

Carl G. Kimball, driver of the bug, was thrown clear of the car and escaped without injuries. He told officers that he was climbing the grade up Hayden mountain and was going not more than 15 miles an hour when Whitney, who was sitting beside him, suddenly grabbed hold of the steering wheel and turned it sharply toward the left. The car swerved toward the edge of the highway and before Kimball could get it back on the roadway, the wheels locked, he said. The car plunged into the ditch, with Whitney beneath it.

Kimball said he could not account for Whitney having grabbed hold of the wheel. He said there was no traffic on the road and the curve was not a sharp one. A few minutes before he said he had asked Whitney if he wanted to drive but the other said he felt too nervous.

**Enroute to Ashland**

The young men were coming to Ashland where they planned to work in the fruit orchards this summer. Whitney had lived here for several years and was well known throughout the country. He had been employed by the Klamath Packing company at Klamath Falls for the past year.

The deceased is survived by his widow, Mrs. Lola Whitney, and three children. The children are Edwin, aged 11; Peter, aged 2; and Alden age 3 months. He also leaves a mother, Mrs. Mary Whitney of Los Angeles and three brothers and sisters living in Los Angeles and San Francisco.

The mother and two of the sisters are now enroute to Klamath Falls for the funeral.

## Blaze Wipes Out Small Community

MONCTON, N. B., June 7.—Fire raged throughout the night and was still burning today in the town of Alma, Alberta county, 45 miles from here. Twelve families are homeless, the Methodist church, the town school house, several garages, three stores, and 12 dwelling houses are in ruins. The fire was believed to be under control this forenoon. Loss was estimated at more than \$100,000.
