KIWANIANS OF THIS SECTION HOLD BANQUET

Ashland, Medford and Klamath Falls Members Enjoy Function

COOPERATION URGED

"Pop" Gates Urges More Unity; Singing, Dancing and Cards Rule

"Southern Oregon cities should boost for the entire section—not devote most of their time envying other cities in the region and trying to take away something from the other cities." "Pop" Gates, of Medford, who was the main speaker at the Kiwanis Inter-club gathering at Lithia Springs hotel last evening, stated. "Ashland has many things which Medford hasn't, and never will have, just as Medford has some things which Ashland hasn't. Ashland has beautiful Lithia Park, which Medford can not duplicate, nor can Medford ever hope to take this away from Ashland. If you notice on Sunday there are many times more Medford people in your park than there are Ashland people. We are proud that Lithia Park is in Southern Oregon, and this is the way that all Southern Oregon should feel about the many advantages of this region," Mr. Gates said in emphasizing the need of greater cooperation between the cities.

Don't Tell Walter

One of the earlier speakers had stated that all income was not measured in mere money and in emphasizing the value of happiness. Mr. Gates spoke of this, and added: "But don't tell Walter Pierce about this, for he will certainly want to put a tax on this form of income if he hears of it."

The meeting, which was attended by a large number of the Kiwanians from the three clubs of Southern Oregon, Klamath Falls, Medford and Ashland, was opened with song and prayer, and then President J. H. Hardy called on the secretaries of the three clubs to introduce their members. Carl Loveland led the singing throughout the program. Carl Tengwald read the "Kiwanis Creed" and Pres. Hardy followed with a welcome to the visitors, stating that such meetings boosted a deeper inter-club relationship and better fellowship among the business men of Southern Oregon.

Music Enjoyed

Carl Loveland gave a solo, "I Never Knew," and after this he called on all present to join in on a song, "I Want to Go Where You Go," which Loveland said had been dedicated to the Siamese twins. W. A. Wiest, past president of the Klamath Falls club, brought a message of good fellowship from across the mountains and derided the mad, helter-skelter rush of present days which prevents so many from giving due thought to friendship and sincerity in living. After the banquet and program last evening, the Kiwanis, their wives and friends enjoyed dancing and cards at the hotel.

This meeting was held in conjunction with the international Kiwanis meeting in Montreal.

PUBLIC IS WARNED THAT FIRECRACKERS MUST NOT BE USED

Police and Fire Chiefs Say That All Violators Will Be Arrested

Police and fire officials are going to be more severe than usual this year on persons who attempt to sell or shoot off firecrackers, rockets, Roman candles or any other fireworks this July 4th. It was announced today by Chief of Police McNabb and Fire Chief Baughman.

A city ordinance prohibits the sale or use of all kinds of fireworks, and because of the unusually warm weather and dry spring, which has brought a serious fire hazard, no violations of any kind will be tolerated, the two officials said.

The only fireworks display which will be tolerated will be that planned for the organized July 4th celebration by the Lithians and other civic organizations on the night of July 5th. This permit will be issued through the mayor and city council.

"We simply want to warn merchants that any attempts to sell firecrackers or other fireworks to youngsters will be met with immediate arrest and prosecution," said Chief McNabb this morning. "A city ordinance provides a severe penalty of both fine and imprisonment for persons who sell fireworks or persons who use them, and we are determined that the ordinance must be strictly enforced."

Southern Oregon Students To Aid University Work

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore., June 8.—(Special)—Klamath, Jackson, Josephine and Curry counties are represented by 11 students on the Greater Oregon committee which is to function during the summer in order to attract the more desirable students to the University and to help make the Semi-Centennial celebration, October 18-23, a state-wide event.

The purpose of the committee, it was stated, is not to get the largest number of students from Klamath, Jackson, Josephine and Curry counties, but to get the best quality, those who will benefit most by the University training and are best fitted to do the work. The committee, according to Virgil Earl, director of athletics, who is helping in the organization, opens a new era in the University's effort to bring desirable material to the campus. "We are stressing this year not so much quantity as quality of the men and women whom we will visit," he pointed out.

James Manning, of Klamath Falls, is general chairman of this district. He will be assisted by Orth Sisomere, Katherine Ulrich, Edith Dodge, John Galey, Ward Beene, Dorothy Brown, Art Schoenl, Dorothy Lundburg, Milton Green and Ted Tamba.

Normal Registrar Arrives In City

Miss Katherine M. Vincent, who has been chosen registrar for the new Southern Oregon state normal school, arrived in Ashland yesterday and is now shaping her work in order to be ready for the registrations and other work incidental to the opening of the summer session of the school on June 21.

Miss Vincent for the past three years has been registrar for the Lewiston, Idaho, state normal school, and comes to the Ashland institution highly recommended.

Prof. A. C. Strange, a faculty member, has arrived in the city with his family, and other faculty members are expected to arrive during the not few days.

Jefferson Myers of Portland Named to United States Ship Board

EX-STATE TREASURER

New Appointee Has Long Been Prominent Democrat in This State

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 8.—(UP)—Jefferson Myers of Portland, prominent Oregon democrat, was today appointed to the United States shipping board by President Coolidge. He succeeds Bert E. Haney, also of Portland, who recently resigned after an extended controversy with the president.

It is believed the senate will confirm the Portland man's appointment within a short time.

Mr. Myers is a former state treasurer of Oregon and also a former state senator. He was appointed state treasurer by Governor Walter M. Pierce to fill out the unexpired term of O. P. Hoff, who died while in office.

Mr. Myers came to Washington at the request of President Coolidge for a personal interview before the appointment was made.

CROOKED PREACHER WILL GO TO PRISON

St. Louis Clergyman Faces Long Term for Using Mails to Defraud

ST. LOUIS, Mo., June 8.—(UP)—Rev. William E. Rutledge, editor of the "Preacher's Magazine," Baptist minister who swindled scores of pastors out of their meager savings by selling them stock in his Economy Oil company, faces a federal prison term for the offense.

Rev. Rutledge was convicted on a charge of using the mails to defraud. Scores of persons whose connection with the church testified that his oil stock had about the cash value of graduation diplomas from the Baptist Sunday school.

BROOKHART WINNER IN SENATE BATTLE

Veteran Solon, Albert Cummins, Apparently Defeated in Iowa

DES MOINES, Iowa, June 8.—(UP)—Smith W. Brookhart, independent proponent for farm relief and former United States senator, today apparently won the republican senatorial nomination as he was leading the veteran senator, Albert B. Cummins, by 30,000 votes with over half the returns in.

Politicians believe Brookhart's lead will increase as distant rural precincts are heard from.

Richardson of San Diego; two brothers, Frank H. Whitney of Portland and Don Whitney of Ashland. They will also be here for the funeral.

Drinks Carbolec Acid; Found Dead

BEND, Ore., June 8.—(UP)—Riding to a secluded spot along the Deschutes river below Bend, Clarence Mahn, aged 45, took his own life by drinking a bottle of carbolec acid, according to an opinion expressed by the coroner today. The dead man left a farewell note but gave no explanation for his act.

Chamber Forum Luncheon Hears Good Report From F. M. Carter

PROSPECTS PROMISING

Ashland Should Do Real Advertising Says Ashland Hotel Owner

"I do not believe any section of the country will appeal more to the deposed farmers of the Owens Valley of California, than the Rogue River valley will," F. M. Carter, who, with Olin Arnsperger, recently made a trip to that region, stated at the chamber of commerce forum today at noon.

Mr. Carter gave a clear, concise history of the Owens Valley disturbance and said that it was generally understood that before long practically every farm in that region would be deserted. The type of farmer is that of the pioneer, a hard worker and a home lover. He said Owens Valley was a shut-in community, with no railroad facilities, and that the many advantages of the Rogue River valley would be appreciated.

80 Will Come

Fully 80 of the farmers assured Messrs Carter and Arnsperger that they intended to come to Oregon to look for a new home, and the Jackson county delegates were assured that land in this county would be inspected.

Mr. Carter said these farmers would start north soon and urged the chamber of commerce to have a land settlement committee ready to function and that every courtesy should be shown the Owens Valley visitors. He recommended that these prospective settlers be shown about the valley.

Hansen Speaks

Lou Hansen, owner of The Hotel Ashland, who has just returned from Spokane where he attended a Hotel Greeters' convention, reported that wonderful hospitality had been extended to them.

He stated that Ashland should make advertising one of its main efforts and that the city should have attractive booklets, none of which he could find in Portland and other places.

L. S. Brown, a new member, was introduced, and H. L. Claycomb and Earl Crow, who have procured several new C. O. C. members, made reports. Vic Mills acted as chairman of the meeting.

GRAND JURY HOLDS MINING PROMOTERS

Portland Tailor Among Those Indicted for Alleged Crooked Work

SEATTLE, Wash., June 8.—(UP)—Federal agents today planned to continue wholesale arrests of 31 men indicted by the grand jury at Tacoma for alleged fraud in connection with the promotion of the Ruby Beach Mining company. Nearly a thousand investors are said to have lost \$250,000. Those arrested to date include A. C. Parson of Seattle, Rat Barkhurst of Portland, C. R. St. Clair of Mollala, Wesley Brooks, Charles Dewhite, Albert W. Curtis and Carl B. Riddell of Bellingham, and R. G. Lane, John E. Epton, A. R. Evanson and A. R. Hillard of Aberdeen.

Offers Cemetery Plot For Bonds

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 8.—The deed to a cemetery lot in Maine was offered to the judge for sale by Herbert E. Finney, when he was arrested on a charge of drunkenness. The offer, however, was not acceptable to the court and Finney went to jail.

Chicago To Have Official Shakeup

CHICAGO, June 8.—Immediate removal of C. H. Jenkins, state welfare director, and Will Colvin, superintendent of the state division of pardons and paroles, "to check the flow of dangerous convicts back into the underworld of the city," has been recommended by the special grand jury which spent five weeks investigating the causes of the Chicago crime wave following the machine gun murder of Assistant State's Attorney William H. McSwiggin.

Astoria Business House Is Closed

PORTLAND, Ore., June 8.—(UP)—Because Thomas Withers, landlord, appeared more interested in rents than in the character of the place, Federal Judge Bean today granted abatement proceedings which will close an Astoria business house for one year. The action was asked because of numerous liquor law violations by renters of the building.

POULTRY WILL BECOME LARGE INDUSTRY HERE

Ashland Declared to be Best Place in United States For Chickens

SCHOOL TO BE HELD

Chicken Raisers to Receive Instruction From County Agent Fowler

Ashland is destined to become the poultry center for Southern Oregon, and R. G. Fowler, county agent, will devote much of his time to the poultry industry as well as to dairying and farm crops he has advised local poultry raisers.

Another school for poultry producers will be held in Ashland this summer by Mr. Fowler, who says he will stress this industry in this section of the county. He will advocate poultry as the leading industry on many of the smaller farms of Jackson county.

A middle western auto tourist who was in Ashland last week told a local business man that he had written the department of agriculture at Washington, D. C., concerning a good location for entering the poultry business.

Ashland Favored

He says that the department replied by advising him it thought Ashland, Oregon, was the most ideal location in the United States for the poultry industry. With federal support and publicity such as this, it is believed the poultry business can be greatly increased in this section and that Ashland can equal the famed Petaluma country as a poultry and egg center.

L. P. Wilcox, who recently was appointed county agent for Jackson county, will handle the horticultural end exclusively, while Mr. Fowler will supervise the poultry, dairy and crop work for the county.

The horticulturist is now engaged in expanding the fight against the codling moth, while he also plans to give increased attention to control of the peach blight.
